1.4 DECLARATION OF PECUNIARY INTERESTS, SIGNIFICANT NON-PECUNIARY INTERESTS AND LESS THAN SIGNIFICANT NON-PECUNIARY INTERESTS

The provisions of Chapter 14 of the Local Government Act, 1993 (the Act) regulate the way in which Councillors and designated staff of Council conduct themselves to ensure that there is no conflict between their private interests and their public role.

The Act prescribes that where a member of Council (or a Committee of Council) has a direct or indirect financial (pecuniary) interest in a matter to be considered at a meeting of the Council (or Committee), that interest must be disclosed as soon as practicable after the start of the meeting and the reasons given for declaring such interest.

As members are aware, the provisions of the Local Government Act restrict any member who has declared a pecuniary interest in any matter from participating in the discussion or voting on that matter, and requires that member to vacate the Chamber.

Council's Code of Conduct provides that if members have a non-pecuniary conflict of interest, the nature of the conflict must be disclosed. The Code of Conduct also provides for a number of ways in which a member may manage non pecuniary conflicts of interest.

SUPPORTING INFORMATION

The Board met in Sydney to allow members to attend to Country Mayors Association Health Forum later in the day.

Speakers to the meeting included DPE representatives Amanda Chadwick, Executive Director Performance Division -Water Group, Jim Bentley, Deputy Secretary & CEO NSW Water Sector and Shagofta Ali, Leader of the Regional Water Strategies.



The meeting considered fourteen reports where the full agenda is available on the website https://www.centraljo.nsw.gov.au/business-papers-agendas//. There was significant discussion on the opportunities from the federal election result where further advocacy will be undertaken in June alongside of the National General Assembly in June. Advice is sought from members in this regard where correspondence has been provided separately to this report to Council.

A media release was called for and subsequently issued via Mayors that recognises the role of 'local' in the future of the nation's leadership. https://www.centraljo.nsw.gov.au/media-releases/

Statement of Budget and Revenue 2022-2023

The Board approved the 2022/2023 Budget and Statement of Revenue to the Board with a 2.5% increase in fees with the exception of fees for the Central Joint Organisation Water Utilities' Alliance which will have no increase; and an internally restricted reserve of \$150K to enable outcomes from the Best Practice in Procurement Program.

Of interest is;

- the Chair of GMAC is progressing discussion with Lithgow City Council on their interest in membership options;
- The Board is to receive a report on working more closely with Penrith City including membership options; and
- UMCC Upper Macquarie Country Council is to become an associate member.

Best Practice in Aggregated Procurement

The outgoing Board received a report in November 2021 and resolved inter alia to recommend to the incoming Board that it adopt the BPAP Stages 1-6 reports and progress a number of recommendations.

Aggregated procurement has shown over \$5m of savings to members since the JO was proclaimed in May 2018. Please find more detail on cost savings and other value of the JO later in this report.

At the February 2022 meeting, the Board requested a presentation on the BPAP findings which was provided to members via Zoom on 5 May 2022. The presentation can be provided on request. The Board adopted all the recommendations which will now be implemented through the General Managers' Advisory Committee (GMAC).

The Statement of Budget and Revenue makes provision for further investment in this program.

Electric Vehicles

member Seven Councils submitted an EOI to the NSW Government's ΕV fast charging application. It is understood that some Councils have been contacted by charging network operators. Councils wish to seek further support from ChargeWorks to assist with responses from operators as a result of the EOI, the JO has agreed to provide each Council up to 2.5 hours of support, which will be funded through the Building OLG Capacity



funding earmarked for energy projects.

The round focusing on destination chargers has recently been announced, opening on 23 May and closing on 23 September. The site assessment work undertaken by ChargeWorks in September 2021 identified the following destination charging sites:

The grant guidelines state that DC charging is not covered, so consideration is being given to those sites in the table above flagged for 25kW DC charging and whether 22kW is a suitable alternative.

Support is being provided to members via the JO and the DPE Sustainable Councils team who have provided further funding to engage Chargeworks to assist Councils in preparing and collating the information required for the grant round.

Review of the CNSWJO Strategy

CNSWJO must review its strategy each term. Given JO Board meetings are quarterly, 6 Mayors nominated to form a subcommittee to take on the role of development of the strategy. The mandated Statement of Strategic Regional Priority is due in December 2022 and the subcommittee have been meeting regularly. Council will receive correspondence separately on the work undertaken by the subcommittee including seeking feedback on the draft priorities for the region.

The Board adopted the Central NSW Economic and Social Environmental Scan and this is available on the CNSWJO website at https://www.centraljo.nsw.gov.au/reports-policies/. This document provides advice on the opportunities identified at the State and Federal level for the Central NSW region and is a useful resource for Councils as it brings together a significant number of strategies the impact all members.

Finally, there will be a Summit in region in September where all Councillors will be invited to come together to shape the regional strategy going forward.

Transport

Industry attending a meeting in Forbes, July 2019 identified the need for work to be done to enable Small to Medium Enterprise to access Inland Rail.

Subsequently a successful application by the CNSWJO and RDA Central West for a fully funded business case to be developed for a productivity enhancement project for Inland Rail. This project is being funded by the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications.

The Board adopted the P2_022 Central West Consolidation Centre Gate 2 Pre-Feasibility Study report requires this project is at Gateway 2 -prefeasibility, we can now progress to Gateway 3.

Water

Please request the full report that provides updates on advocacy by the region across multiple fronts in the strategic water planning and management space, including;

- information on the Options Assessment Process for the Regional Water Strategies,
- 10 yearly independent review by the Natural Resources Commission of the Water Sharing Plans for the Belubula Regulated, Macquarie Bogan Unregulated and Lachlan Unregulated River Water Sources 2012;
- on feedback to Infrastructure Australia on water infrastructure in their Regional Strengths and Infrastructure Gaps report.

With the implementation of a new Regulatory Framework for Local Water Utilities proposed to take effect from 1 July 2022, the Town Water Risk Reduction Program (TWRRP) has sought feedback on a draft Regulatory Framework for LWUs over April. While the sector has been working with the TWRRP for the past 18 months the issuing of the draft framework has drawn together the various moving parts of the program into one document that will be supported with a number of Guidance Notes currently being drafted.

At the same time the region is being asked to provide feedback to the Natural Resources Commission on whether the decade old Water Sharing Plans based on 20-year-old data should be reviewed or just extended. Town water was definitely an afterthought in these plans. It is critical that they are reviewed.

Likewise, the IA Regional Strengths and Infrastructure Gaps report does not adequately represent the region's current or future needs with respect to town water.

Where the State Government has emphasised the importance of the Regional Water Strategies in addressing water needs including for towns, progress is slow. Current advice is that they should be on exhibition in the second half of this calendar year.



- 4. An operating deficit in water (\$0.54 million) and an operating surplus in sewer funds (\$1.34 million) in the 2022/23 financial year. Surpluses in these funds are accumulated to meet future capital costs as the city grows, modelled over a 30-year plan.

The **Draft Budget 22/23** has been developed through consultation with the community via the Community Strategic Plan, with Councillors and with Managers and Directors via a budget bid process.

The **Draft Budget 22/23** will continue the trend of deficit budgets to a lesser extent as Council moves towards a balanced overall budget in 2023/24. Council makes this decision to continue the stimulus impact on the City.

The **Draft Budget 22/23** includes a capital spend of \$68.3M in 2022/2023 and \$196.3M over the four-year period 2022/2023 to 2025/2026.

5.2 Adoption of Integrated Planning & Reporting Documents - Community Strategic Plan, Delivery/Operational Plan and Resourcing Strategy

The budget position is subject to headwinds which are emerging across Local Government. At the time of writing of this report the State Government had yet to respond to IPART's stated 0.7% rate peg position. Electricity and gas prices are to rise by 15-25% in the new financial year according to most sources, project costs are continuing to escalate and depreciation arising out of asset revaluation continues to plague all of Local Government.

In terms of the exhibition, the Draft budget has not been significantly changed as Council is intending to go through a September mini-budget process to align the budget with the CSP. This approach is being adopted due to the truncated timelines arising from the postponed elections.

Slight additions have been made to include some emergency capital works associated with Council's operations. A delayed election timeframe because of COVID-19 created a significantly compressed process for the creation of these plans. This necessitated developing the plans concurrently meaning there is still some work to be done on a complete alignment of the documents.

This report foreshadows a proposed mini budget for September this year. This mini budget will allow this alignment to proceed and to better understand some of the implications of the changing priorities revealed in the community engagement to develop the draft CSP.

Council will need to consider its overall forward position. Our position against benchmarks remains above recommended levels. They are dropping which is in line with our historical plan to invest in the city and from the difficult Covid years. Pleasingly and as always, our debt cover ratio is above the benchmark and we should maintain that in our opinion. One day soon it will be time to 'pull out of the dive'.

Council needs to adopt the budget in order to allow Council's operations to continue after July 1 2022.

The Exhibition

The community response to exhibition of the draft Community Strategic Plan, Delivery and Operational plans and other associated documents through the YourSay site is as follows:

- 295 people visited the Budget/CSP site
- 119 visited multiple pages on the site
- 88 People downloaded budget and/or CSP documents
- 45 people completed an online survey
- 7 people contributed comments

Survey Results:

- There was significant support (see pie charts) for features of the draft budget including continued spending on the FutureCity CBD upgrade, the sports precinct, Shiralee area water infrastructure, and the next stage of the southern feeder road.
- Very strong support for extra footpath spending.
- Slightly less support for airport spending.
- There was approximately 50/50 support/opposition to Council increasing Fees & Charges in line with the CPI.
- There was significant opposition to Council seeking a special rates variation (67%).

5.2 Adoption of Integrated Planning & Reporting Documents - Community Strategic Plan, Delivery/Operational Plan and Resourcing Strategy

Seven people chose to leave longer more thoughtful comments:

- Criticism about the difficulty of understanding the budget.
- Five comments critical of the Mt Canobolas MTB project, including a long contribution from Uncle Neil Ingram.
- A call to allocate even more money towards upgrade Forest Rd (This originally came as an online comment to the Council website and was added as a YourSay contribution).

BUDGET/CSP

The survey questions on the CSP asked for a response to several key new directions included in the draft CSP.

- There was 75% support for Council tackling shortage of affordable and social housing and seeking more diversity in housing.
- There was 59% support for Council seeking to provide more recreation options for young people in Orange.
- There was 59% support for Council taking action to address problems of poverty and social inequity in Orange.

As well as providing Yes/No/Undecided responses, a number of people took the opportunity to provide additional brief text responses. A selection follows.

Social and affordable housing comments included:

- The recent expansion of heritage conservation areas (HCAs) has limited many options for increasing housing density in close proximity to the CBD. These expanded HCAs don't seem to contribute much/any heritage value, with many dwellings being new or renovated.
- More focus on affordable housing, as locals are being priced out of the area they grew up in.
- No more urban sprawl having small blocks, we are regional.
- Housing is at a critical level in Orange. I'm a pensioner and am in private housing. I live daily with worry about the rent going up or the owners wanting to sell.
- Affordable housing and rentals are desperately needed, land prices are too high. We need more options for well-maintained unit complexes or townhouses with shared green space. Would also love to see a co-housing type initiative in Orange.
- More diversity to younger people trying to get a house to rent.
- All new developments need to provide affordable housing options, the developers will not do this without being forced to so it's up to council to look at this seriously.

Recreation options for young people comments included:

- Paintball field or go-kart track would be fun.
- Keep prices at the Olympic Pool more realistic to enable all to attend.
- Fenced playgrounds with toilets. Bike pump track please. Also level paved paths for learners or young ones - Gosling Creek is perfect but that's the only suitable site for little kids.

5.2 Adoption of Integrated Planning & Reporting Documents - Community Strategic Plan, Delivery/Operational Plan and Resourcing Strategy

Poverty and social inequity comments included:

- That's not really in the charter of local government to provide. The wood bank, for example, is a terrible concept and impossible to be implemented fairly. It sets a 'hand-out' precedent and should not be council's responsibility.
- This issue is a close one to me as a single parent, that faced housing insecurity in 2021. Rising rents, petrol, groceries & costs of living are putting so much pressure on households, and we are now completely priced out of the housing market.
- This should be adopted as a priority by Council despite jurisdictional arguments i.e. it's the State Gov's job, particularly while many people are living in their cars in a car park one block from Council chambers.

General comments included:

- Fix the roads correctly and to a level that ensures they last.
- Establish facilities/ infrastructure to push the towns peoples focus to the outskirts of town for shopping, housing and recreation
- Remove "blanket" trash pickups in the way of vouchers for rate payers and online requests for others who are unable to get access to allow for self-sufficient disposal at the tip.
- The Mountain Bike Proposal on Mt Canobolas is a fantastic initiative and would be a
 massive draw card to Orange, along with bringing in the funds to manage and
 conserve the environment. It is a disgrace up there at the moment with the amount
 of weeds and feral animals. Mountain biking tourism is huge elsewhere in Australia
 and across the world.
- The biggest issue for our community right now is the poor state of our roads. I see very little talk of a plan to deal with these issues except patching over patches, which only creates a bigger issue.
- Better planning for the next 10 years, cut costs, make more savings on service provision, reduce staff in low priority areas, more accountability and transparency, improve communication with ratepayers and senior staff show more respect to ratepayers.
- Council should stick to investment into core services rather than left field peripheral services. Planetarium and expansion of music conservatorium are "nice to have" and are not essential.
- The severe lack of available childcare in Orange is it such high importance as it is hindering the ability of skilled employees to return to work.
- Although education is not the responsibility of Council, there might be a need for an
 alternative (but registered and accredited) school in Orange to meet specific needs.
 There are several examples in NSW. This might work alongside sustainability
 initiatives in Orange such as a vertical garden complex and promotion of unique,
 sustainable business opportunities.

Aside from the online engagement a number of residents took the opportunity to provide more detailed submissions during the exhibition period.

5.2 Adoption of Integrated Planning & Reporting Documents - Community Strategic Plan, Delivery/Operational Plan and Resourcing Strategy

• In all 34 were received. Of these 32 opposed funding on the mountain bike proposal on Mt Canobolas. The opposition generally related to cultural, environment and biodiversity protection. One of the submissions received also raised issues around the CSP process, alignment with Delivery and Operational plans and housing affordability. The other sought road upgrades on Forest Road between Spring Terrace and Spring Hill and works on Worboys Street and Whiley Road. A Cancer Council submission sought a "commitment to plan and budget properly in advance for built and natural shade in public spaces including playgrounds, parks, recreation and sporting facilities, active travel networks and town centre."

Project/Initiatives List

A number of residents also defined projects they thought should be included in Council's forward operations:

- Road upgrades on Forest Road between Spring Terrace and Spring Hill
- Works on Worboys Street and Whiley Road
- Action on social and affordable housing
- More affordable prices at Aquatic Centre
- Fenced, accessible and shaded playgrounds with toilets
- Bike pump track
- Footpath near Orange Anglican Grammar School (students not permitted to walk to school)
- Indoor Play Centre (Paintball, indoor skating, rock climbing)
- Splash park
- Increased road maintenance/upgrade funding
- Augment water supply
- Huntley Rd upgrade
- Footpath maintenance
- Expanded footpath network

Responses to the Exhibition

In brief:

Council will have the opportunity to address many of the projects and issues arising out of the exhibition through the September minibudget.

In terms of the theme of inequity arising out of the significantly changed housing prices in Orange, Council is attempting to address these concerns as best as possible through Strategies arising out of the Local Housing Strategy recently adopted.

Council will consider roads and other infrastructure in the September minibudget but largely these are in the project lists attached to the budget.

The proposed Mt Canobolas Mountain Bike project features in the future budget projects as a project with no funding source. Several other projects are similarly listed such as the theatre expansion and the aquatic centre expansion. The project is still in the approval phase and will require further Council consideration to proceed. The project will be brought to Council in the future for consideration.

5.2 Adoption of Integrated Planning & Reporting Documents - Community Strategic Plan, Delivery/Operational Plan and Resourcing Strategy

IPART and the State Government Response on rates

At the time of writing of this report the State Government had yet to respond to IPART's stated 0.7% rate peg position. The Adopted budget assumes/includes a rate rise of 2.5% in line with Council's long term financial plan. The State Government's response is due on June 21.

The impact on the budget in operational terms if \$662,670 if the 2.5% is not approved.

The budget was amended slightly

Other continuing issues yet to be resolved include the Emergency Services Levy, RFS assets and the rates position.

Council holds a considerable land portfolio and continues the previous Council's land sales process. The timeline for sales is somewhat subject to the vagaries of the market and preparation of land for sale.

Depreciation is a constant issue for Local Government – Money needs to be put aside for renewal of assets – if not then the impact is merely transferred to future Councils. Once assets are revalued **up** then we need to adjust the ongoing funds we put aside to replace them one day.


Another depreciation hit is looming which will affect the 2022/23 budget. A consultant will be providing a report on water and sewer 'revals' shortly which will see a further hit to the budget as adopted. This again is a reason to have a September minibudget to address out-of-sync matters – IPART, depreciation, RFS assets and Emergency Services Levy for example.

Council will need to consider its overall forward position. Our position against benchmarks remains above recommended levels. They are dropping which is in line with our historical plan to invest in the city and from the difficult Covid years. Pleasingly and as always, our debt cover ratio is above the benchmark and we should maintain that in our opinion. One day soon it will be time to 'pull out of the dive'.



Externally restricted funds are those funds that have been received for a specific purpose and may only be used for the purpose that they have been received, for example, the money received for Water access and usage charges by legislation are only available to be spent for the operation, maintenance, and expansion of the Water supply network.

Internally restricted funds are those that Council has earmarked for a particular purpose, but Council can have that purpose changed.

Unrestricted funds are those available for use to continue the day-to-day operations of Council, made up of General Fund investments and cash only.

The unrestricted cash position movements during the month are normal as projects commence and income is received. Movements may also arise following processing of income received between funds or into restricted assets to appropriately allocate for the purposes Council has determined. Council's cash flow is monitored daily, and some investments may be redeemed rather than rolled over to support operational requirements.

The 2022/23 budget allocates \$800,000 to Forest Road. It is not stated as to what section of Forest Road this money is to be spent, or what type of work is required. However, as a local resident who uses the road regularly the amount of money allocated is far to little for the work that is required. On Forest Road from Spring Terrace to Spring Hill there remains sections of road pavement that require urgent attention. At \$1 Million a kill ometer to rebuild a modern roadway, the budgeted amount is clearly inadequate. The pavement is badly broken, uneven, and poorly drained. Forest Road, along with Worboys Street (in Spring Hill Village) and Whileys Road are major thorough fares for heavy vehicles to Cadia Mine, particularly the trucks taking blue metal aggregate from Shadfort h quarry to the mine on a daily basis. The surfaces of these roads where not built for the long-term use by heavy vehicles and with recent wet weather are deteriorating to the point of being dangerous to drive along in a small vehicle. They now need to be reinfor ced and resurfaced. 


As residents and ratepayers living in Orange for over 45 years, we would like to first of all thank Orange City Council for providing the opportunity to participate in the "YourSay Orange" survey and now to comment on the outcomes. Under the heading of "What makes your community a great place to live?" The top two responses were "Beautiful, natural environment (10.4%) and Lifestyle (9.5%). It also shows that Mount Canobolas (Gaanha-bula) is recognised and valued across the Orange community.

Sadly, the Mount Canobolas State Conservation Area (SCA) has been in the news over the past 16 months because of the threat of Orange City Council's plans for a 100km mountain bike trail centre, 70km of which is planned for the SCA. This development is not what the majority of residents and ratepayers want and would certainly not gain any benefit from. Mountain biking is already very well catered for in the Orange district and encroachment on a sensitive, sub-alpine conservation area is completely unjustifiable. There are thousands of hectares of State Forests available for mountain bike trails to challenge all abilities and for staging high-level competitions.

We congratulate the Orange Mountain Bike Club for their initiative in constructing the Gulinbundinya Trail at Lidster and working on the return loop using the \$325 000 grant they received from the State Government. Trails in pine forests have no negative impact on the environment because the area is already heavily disturbed. In a couple of years' time the Club will be able to re-establish the highly regarded trails in Kinross State Forest as well.

We've noted that in the Draft Budget Papers that an allocation of \$1 500 000 has been made for a "Mount Canobolas - Mountain Bike Trail Centre". This is in addition to the \$500 000 Council has already spent on preliminary environmental studies and trail designs. There is no certainty that such a Trail Centre will be approved by the Department of Planning and we feel it's time to re-allocate such ratepayers funds to projects that will benefit all the community, not just a small number of elite sports people who are indeed already well catered for.

Surely the needs of the Orange community would be better served by spending ratepayers funds on improving active transport infrastructure (shared paths, cycle lanes on roads, children's bicycle parks, etc). When Kinross Forest Mountain Bike Park re-opens, Orange City Council could support the venture by funding infrastructure such as car parking, picnic facilities, toilets and trails suitable for children. What a great way to introduce the sport to the next generation! If bringing in more tourist dollars is one of the main aims of the proposed trail centre, we note that Orange's tourist accommodation is already thriving, with visitors seeking out local attractions (especially the Mount Canobolas SCA), the food and wine scene, cultural attractions, cycling the quiet country roads and the Orange and Villages Bicycle Trail, etc.

Thanks for the opportunity to comment on the Community Strategic Plan. It is such an important document in Council's planning and budgeting cycle.

First up, I wanted to congratulate Council staff on the quality of the draft document. In particular:

- it is beautifully presented with great use of photos and infographics
- the infographic on pages 14 and 15 is one of the best I've seen makes it very easy to understand the demographics of the Orange community
- as a result of the presentation, the important information it contains is very accessible
- the Plan does a great job (mostly) of reflecting input from the extensive community consultation.

However, there are a few areas where I think the plan lacks. These include:

- 'Housing supply, diversity, affordability, and resilience' was identified by the community as the top challenge for Orange (page 19), yet it only rates a 'dot point' under Objective 5
- 'Environmental sustainability' and 'Climate change and adaptation' are both in the top 6 identified challenges, yet while renewable energy is mentioned in the objectives, climate change adaptation is not
- Item 8.4 on page 28 'Take action to ensure greater stewardship and enjoyment of both Mount Canobolas (Gaahna Bulla) and Lake Canobolas' is ambiguous and doesn't fully reflect the significant environmental and cultural heritage values of Gaahna Bulla.

To address these concerns, please consider the following recommendations:

- 1. Create a new Objective under 'Live' titled 'Improve housing supply, diversity and affordability' (the current 5.3), with specific sub-objectives (including current 5.2). This would reflect the importance of the current housing affordability crisis and the obvious concern the community has about the issue. A healthy, safe, inclusive and vibrant community must start with affordable housing for all.
- 2. Reword 'Objective 1' (page 26) to 'A liveable city that is connected through open spaces and can adapt to future changes in climate', with the addition of relevant sub-objective(s) as required.
- 3. Add a sub-objective under 'Objective 16: Leaders in our community' that reads 'Lead the community in climate change mitigation and adaptation initiatives'.
- 4. Spilt Item 8.4 into two with the following suggested wording: 'Work with government agencies, community organisations and First Nations Elders to ensure greater stewardship and conservation of Mount Canobolas (Gaahna Bulla)' and 'Provide facilities for the enjoyment of both Gaahna Bulla and Lake Canobolas without compromising their environmental and cultural heritage values'.

Dear Mr Waddell and Orange City Councillors,

I write to voice my concerns regarding the protection of Mt Canobolas as a priority in Community Strategic Planning for the Orange region.

Mount Canobolas is an environmentally sensitive, sacred and special place, deserving of complete preservation now and for perpetuity. The unique heritage of humanity for the past 40,000 years and the biodiversity upon this mountain are found nowhere else on earth. This alone deserves our preservation. It has been protected so far and it will be a travesty to disturb it at all.

There is no need to build bike tracks through the mountain nor to use ratepayers funds to benefit a small proportion of the community whilst destroying the sanctity of Gaanha-bula.

The mountain is the only wild and special place in and around the entire area of Orange, whilst there are many places in the state forests that are suitable for bike trails. Mount Canobolas is extremely fragile and erosion will cause irreversible damage in this world class heritage site. Bike tracks will incur incredibly prohibitive ongoing destruction and costs. Bike tracks have become an enormous problem in many jurisdictions, once built with riders making extensive illegal tracks causing irreversible damage at all times of the day and night. Twenty four hour a day surveillance will be near impossible. Furthermore, the wildlife upon the mountain is isolated and with no corridors to retreat for sanctuary, the outcomes will be devastating. They already are.

There are already many fire trails on the mountain which attract motor bikes that terrify me on my walking excursions on the mountain. Furthermore the erosion makes these tracks very difficult to negotiate on foot and currently impassible by motor vehicles. They are in disrepair. The upkeep of any tracks will be prohibitive.

Council could make much better use of funds to enhance the facilities and walking tracks already in use, making them available to all, including persons with limited mobility. An all inclusive approach, together with the ability and need to immerse ourselves in the natural world is at stake if bike tracks are built on the mountain.

It must be noted that Mount Canobolas falls within Cabonne, and Orange Council should be building facilities upon their own land.

It breaks my heart that in this day and age we must continue to speak up for our natural world, which is diminishing at an alarming rate. Climate change and natural disasters cause significant damage to the mountain already. Bike tracks will be a greater threat.

It is with the deepest love of the natural world for this generation and for all to come that we must preserve our most treasured natural asset forever.

Mount Canobolas is our very last significant natural asset. It is imperative to keep it that way.

Feedback on Orange City Council's Draft Community Strategic Plan Documents and Budget

I'm writing as a ratepayer and resident of the Orange City Council (OCC) area and on behalf of my family who live here. I joined the consultation and thank OCC for the opportunity to give feedback on the draft documents.

As many people said during the consultation process, what they value about living in Orange is the beautiful natural environment; Mt Canobolas, the lake, trees, bushland, and natural environments. They also saw environmental sustainability, climate change and adaptation, and reconciliation and recognition of Traditional Owners as challenges.

I look forward to council making a genuine commitment to these concepts through a number of the objectives and activities in the Community Strategic Plan (CSP) and Delivery Program Plan. However, there are some activities and budget items that do not support the environment or address these challenges.

In particular I object to \$1.5 million of ratepayer's money being allocated to a Mt Canobolas Mountain Bike Centre in the 23/24 financial year that is 'hidden' on page 12 of the budget. There is no specific reference to this in the plans and I assume the Centre is to support the Mountain Bike Park Proposal. As that proposal includes more than 70kms of mountain bike tracks in the Mt Canobolas SCA and Crown Land containing native forest it will damage the natural environment, threaten biodiversity, and destroy Wiradjuri cultural heritage....and all on land that is outside the OCC boundaries. This is completely at odds with the community feedback and objectives in the CSP about protecting the natural environment and culture.

As Wiradjuri woman and scientist Kate Harriden said at the recent Conservation in Action Conference 'you need to walk country to get to know it' and 'know what's best for country' when planning any development. I have walked Mt Canobolas SCA since the 2018 fires and am only just starting to get to know how precious it is. A mountain bike track or any major development is not what is best for Mt Canobolas. I wonder how many people planning and supporting the track have taken the time to walk the mountain enough times to truly get to know it?

With scientists I have surveyed and seen the endemic Velvet Worm, the threatened Greater Glider and many of the threatened bird species. I have also surveyed for, and seen, many of the forty native ground orchids, some of which are endemic and threatened. Most humbling for me has been documenting many sites of Aboriginal

occupation that were revealed by the fire and learning a little from Wiradjuri Elders, living in Orange, about their culture. As Mt Canobolas has been a reserve for over 150 years the tangible Wiradjuri heritage is mostly undisturbed while the rest of the Orange landscape has been cleared and farmed. Some of the artefacts are likely to be between 2,000 and 4,000 years old. In other places and other countries this ancient heritage is protected, valued, and celebrated. It is not only precious to the Aboriginal community but should be to everyone in Orange and beyond.

Mt Canobolas was also important for my mental health during Covid lockdowns as were the walking tracks, reserves, and parks that OCC has developed and managed within the city. I fully support the aspects of the plan that include management, enhancement, and expansion of these areas within Orange. They can also be used to support biodiversity if they are linked as native corridors.

Having lived in Orange during the drought and the high-level water restrictions I worry about future availability of water. Council's plans should include better use of recycled water and not rely on extracting even more water out of creeks such as Blackmans Swamp and Summer Hill Creeks. I recently sat beside the creek at Ophir Reserve and was told that water that normally goes to Cadia was being sent down the creek. It looked healthy however I hate to think what it was like when this water was going to the mine. I hope with the changes at Cadia that Orange waste water can be returned to the city for use and also be returned to the creeks. It is positive that OCC will implement its Climate Change Plan and I encourage council to undertake more climate change mitigation strategies. We should not be lulled into a false sense of security by the last few wet years.

On a final note, it is disappointing to see that CSP Objective 7: 'More for young people to do' has not been included in the Delivery Plan. I acknowledge that some of the strategies are covered in Objective 1 and 2 but if I were a young person reading the documents, I would think my needs had been ignored. I also encourage you to check on the spelling of the Wiradjuri name for Mt Canobolas.

It is within Council's powers to take steps, over the next 10 years, to protect the rich natural environmental areas around Orange and within Council boundaries and also respect and celebrate the significant Wiradjuri culture in our landscape. My family and I look forward to seeing this happen.

welcomes the opportunity to provide feedback on, and suggestions for, the Orange City Council's Draft Community Strategic Plan (CSP), Budget and Delivery Program Principal Activity Plan (DPPAP).

It is pleasing to read the CSP Engagement Report and see that the 'beautiful natural environment' rated as the top priority and strength by the community for the next 10 years. Specific mentions of Mount Canobolas, Lake Canobolas, trees, bushland, natural environments, and nature are all key aspects of the consultation that should be reflected in Council's plans and budgets. These plans and the budget should also reflect the challenges the community identified around environmental sustainability, bike tracks on Gaanha-bula, Mt Canobolas and climate change and adaptation.

Welcomes the Mayor's message that OCC will be 'prioritising the environment, protecting, and enjoying our environment along with key social priorities.'

The Engagement Report also noted that some of the main things missing from the previous CSP were climate change and adaptation and environmental stewardship. It is good to see that the draft CSP and DPPAP have some objectives and activities to target these. However more could be done.

Mt Canobolas - Mountain Bike Trail Centre. Despite these words about prioritising and protecting the environment, 'respectful planning that values the natural environment' (Obj.8) and 'action to ensure greater stewardship and enjoyment of Mt Canobolas (Gaanha-bula) (CSP 8.4) the allocation of \$1.5 million in the 23/24 financial year for a 'Mt Canobolas - Mountain Bike Trail Centre' (P12 in draft Budget) completely contradicts these objectives. strongly opposes this budget allocation and requests that it be removed from the budget and plans. Mt Canobolas is the most significant environmental asset in the region so how can council suggest there should be mountain bike tracks fragmenting it? Most people who enjoy Gaanha-bula Mt Canobolas and the SCA do so for passive recreation, cultural connection, citizen science as well as the mental health benefits of the quiet natural surroundings. More than 70kms of mountain bike trails all across the mountain will severely impact the flora and fauna as well as all the other users of Mt Canobolas.

It is noted that CSP objective 8.4 'Take action to ensure greater stewardship and enjoyment of both Mount Canobolas (Gaahna Bulla) and Lake Canobolas' is not included in the DPPAP. As OCC has no legal management responsibility over Mt Canobolas SCA, unlike Lake Canobolas,

stewardship remains with the National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS). If this aspect of the strategy is to remain in the CSP the associated activity should be that 'OCC will work with NPWS to enhance the stewardship of the SCA by respecting and enhancing the conservation values and cultural heritage of Gaanha-bula Mt Canobolas'. This will not be achieved by a mountain bike track that will fragment the environment, increase weed dispersal and erosion, and give greater access to feral animals. OCC's stewardship of Lake Canobolas is commended.

Such a budget allocation of \$1.5 million also contradicts the Acknowledgement to Country in the CSP. This allocation also makes CSP Objective 11, priority 12.1, and 3.4 about 'recognition and prioritisation of Aboriginal culture' hollow as all of Gaanha-bula, Mt Canobolas is a significant Wiradjuri cultural landscape. Intangible knowledge about Gaanha-bula, linked to dreaming stories, exists in the community (as has been acknowledged by OCC in the mural at Lake Canobolas). Much more tangible evidence of occupation, for men and women, has been found across the mountain since the 2018 fire.

members who are OCC ratepayers also object to this additional large amount of ratepayers funds being spent outside the council area for the enjoyment of a few. This is especially so as no business plan for the mountain bike proposal has been released and the assessment process has not been completed and the outcome is not known. A much better alternative is for the mountain bike tracks to be developed in the State Forests surrounding Orange and for them to be funded by grants obtained by the Mountain Bike Club, as has happened recently.

CSP Objective 1: A liveable city that is connected through open spaces.

Page 26 of the CSP lists two activities under this objective relating to parks and open spaces and improved access to shade. However, these have not been carried through to the DPPAP, as it has completely different strategies and activities. commend that parks and open spaces are maintained and assume this includes wetlands and natural areas. We request that the strategies on page 26 of the CSP are carried through to the DPPAP with appropriate activities included. 'Engaging with the community in the planning and development of public open space' is not enough and the target should be the number of open spaces developed and linked. suggest the \$1.5 million allocation for the mountain bike centre would be better spent enhancing the natural environments of OCC parks and open spaces to create green corridors. These corridors would support and allow movement of wildlife and threatened species.

CSP Objective 8: Sustainable growth and respectful planning that values the natural environment. (Please note this is listed as Objective 7 in the DPPAP. It is a pity that Objective 7: More for young people to do is not in the DPPAP).

Despite the environment being a priority there is little in the CSP that aims to protect biodiversity, native bushland, or threatened species from development. While creation and protection of green corridors may help, the ongoing expansion of housing developments in Orange is destroying native habitats, especially mature eucalypt trees. It is also impacting waterways and creeks. This development has been seen as challenge by the community grant arges OCC to include stronger tree protection than at present in the CSP and to implement a mandatory offset scheme for the replacement of trees and native habitat removed in developments. Respectful planning should not be overridden by efficient approval. The DPPAP target of planting 12,000 new native trees, shrubs and grasses is commended and should be in addition to any offsets.

DPPAP activities 7.1.6 to 7.1.8 are supported however a similar activity needs to be added for inspection and control of weeds on OCC owned and managed land. Lack of weed control has been observed by members on some council land would also recommend that the plan include activities for the control of feral animals, such as foxes and feral cats. Evidence of their killing of wildlife has been seen at Ploughman's Wetland.

Water security has been identified as a significant issue. It cannot be solved just by taking water from already stressed streams and environments such as the Blackman's Swamp Creek Stormwater Harvesting Scheme Stage 2. The CSP and DPPAP needs to include alternative strategies such as increased use of recycled water, promoting waterwise gardening and improved subsidises for rainwater tanks.

Council is commended on the ongoing implementation of their Climate Action Plan and Renewable Action Plan and targets.

Comments on activity 8.4, 'the stewardship of Mt Canobolas (Gaanha-bula),' have already been made.

CSP Strategy 9.2 (or 8.2 in DPPAP) seems to focus on waste and more strategies are needed for water and energy in addition to community education.

CSP Objective 11 (Objective 10 in DPAPP): Celebrate our cultural, social, natural and built heritage assets. This is linked to CSP Objective 12: Sustainable tourism.

A suggested activity to be added to this objective in the DPPAP is for OCC to encourage and support businesses that are engaged in environmental or cultural tourism. Gaanha-bula, Mt Canobolas, is one of the natural and cultural heritage assets adjacent to the Council area that should be celebrated. There are also other natural and cultural assets in the region that could be linked to those around Orange.


BirdLife Australia recently released a report 'Bird and Nature Tourism in Australia'. It outlined the value of avitourism. The report found that "National data reveals that birdwatching tourists spend more money than other types of tourists in Australia, and with dedicated marketing and investment, the birdwatching tourism market has huge potential to grow." Geotrails, such as the one that includes the Warrumbungles, is another tourism avenue that could be explored under these objectives. The volcanics of Mt Canobolas, limestone areas to the west and fossils at Canowindra could all be included and bring tourists to Orange.

commends the use of dual naming for Gaanha-bula Mt Canobolas in these documents. One way of 'Preserving the tangible and intangible cultural heritage of the region' (DPPAP 10.2) is for OCC to support any dual naming applications made on behalf of the Wiradjuri community, such as for Mt Canobolas. And as stated earlier the mountain bike track proposal would damage, destroy and not preserve the cultural heritage of Gaanha-bula.

A worthwhile cultural heritage strategy to be added is a review and update of the 2012 Orange Aboriginal Heritage Report. It recommends that this is done every 5 years and a review would provide an opportunity to see if the recommended actions were implemented. This review should be done with appropriate consultation with the Wiradjuri Elders in Orange and the community here.

Closing Comment: welcomes that the community has prioritised the natural environment and hope that the current and future councils strive to implement objectives and strategies that protect and enhance the precious environments in the local area. The Mt Canobolas Mountain Bike Centre and Proposal will not do this. We also welcome the activities that will protect Wiradjuri cultural heritage as they are closely tied to the landscape and environment. We look forward to future opportunities to participate in genuine consultation that has positive outcomes for the environment and Wiradjuri heritage.

I am providing Comments to the 2023/2024 Budget presented to councillors by Orange City Council staff.

Having read the budget papers I visited a number of neighbours to get their viewpoints on the budget.

I have listed their comments for your consideration. I have then documented my concerns.

Their Priorities for the budget are:

If Council wants to spend \$2million outside of Orange then our priority is on roads, footpaths, amenities for families such as child playgrounds, amenities for seniors, sporting facilities for the kids not elite sports, a decent concert theatre that can accommodate at least 2,000 attendees for rock concerts as well as theatre acts.

Get rid of any white elephants, like the helicopter building near the old Bunnings site and there are many more. A rate increase of 2.5% is a result of poor management and Councillors seem to be led along. Very few ratepayers have had a wage increase over the last 3 years and have learnt to live within their means. Orange rates are in the highest tier of rates for regional NSW and Council needs to follow the example of ratepayers by living within their means.

The amount of \$2million for mountain bikes drew comments such as:

- 1.Orange City Council are using ratepayers money in another Council area without proper consultation with rate payers,
- 2. How legal is it for Council to spend our rates in another Council area.
- 3. If it is a forgone conclusion why isnt Council applying a levy to business that will profit from the Mountain bike tracks.
- 4. Council haven't communicated with ratepayers about the reasons behind their spending on mountain bike trails.
- 5. Other sports that have a big following in Orange like Hockey have little support from Orange City Council and they bring in State wide Carnivals.
- 6 Council needs to be more efficient and do a proper review of its activities so ratepayers get a decent service.
- 7. Council cant even fix the potholes, drivers have to go around potholes on many Roads so why spend money in another Council area.
- 8. Motor Cross is a popular sport with no support from Council, not like Mountain bikes.
- 9. Ratepayers will be subsidising a sports stadium in the future, no budget.

How much will ratepayers be subsidising the Mountain bike trails in the future, no budget.

My response to the budget is in the main supporting what my neighbours have said about the budget.

I have concerns about the \$2million to be spent on Mountain bike trails on Mount Canobolas. I am a regular visitor and user of Mount Canobolas State Conservation area. I have always been concerned about the condition of the area and have reported such to National Parks, it has been very poorly managed by the State Government. The area has been subjected to numerous bushfires which have done untold damage to the plants and creatures. Orange Council and Cabonne Council Ratepayers don't do any repatriation of the area, concerned citizens do. Spending \$2million on mountain bike trails in a fire prone area doesn't make sense and potentially could increase the risk of bushfires and damage to native vegetation. Mountain bike racing doesnt protect the environment only damage it.

I understand the Orange CSP has made it clear to Council and Councillors the protection of the environment in the SCA on Mount Canobolas is a high priority.

The CSP clearly doesn't support a mountain bike track in the SCA. It begs the question what does a State Conservation area mean to Orange City Council, the NSW State Government and Cabonne Council if they ignore what is the true purpose of these areas i.e conservation of the environment including plants and creatures which are special to the community and deserve protection

Any development within the SCA would be in direct conflict with Councils delivery Plans.

I don't oppose mountain bike tracks, trails on Mount Canobolas only putting in the SCA on Mount Canobolas. There is room for both and Forests NSW have said that the State Forests are very suitable for this purpose. There has to be areas protected from damage from mountain bikes and these are the SCA Mount Canobolas. Additionally Council won't have to spend \$2million for the tracks or trails.

Prior to approving the budget councillors must be able to provide Orange Ratepayers the business case and justify the spending of \$2million dollars of hard earned ratepayers money.

The fact Orange City Council is spending \$2 million in CAbonne Council is possibly the illegal use of Ratepayers funding and Council hasnt justified to ratepayers the reason for doing this. There is most likely legislation that prohibits this type of expenditure. Council need to answer this question.

In my opinion Council should reduce our rates by at least \$2million in 2023/2024 instead of continuing this action related to the mountain bike trails.

If you wish me to provide more reasons as a community representative I am only too please to do such.

Submission - Budget 2023/24

I am writing to the Council and all Councillors on the above to voice my objection to the allocating of \$1.5mil. in Council's Draft Budget for years 2023/24 for Mount Canobolas Mountain Bike Centre.

I oppose this allocation because approval has not been given for OCC's mountain bike proposal as a State Significant Development (SSD). Nor has OCC succeeded in gaining approval for the mountain bike proposal to go ahead.

The lack of understanding shown by OCC is totally confusing. It considers that it is permissible to cut off little bits of the SCA and declare one bit a 'sensitive no-go' area and another bit suitable for a mountain bike trail despite acknowledgement by the mayor that Council is dealing with a 'very special environmentally sensitive area'. If the mayor recognises this then he should be making sure this special area is fully protected instead of delighting in the progress towards achieving what he refers to as a 'generational project' - whatever that means! The area is a State Conservation Area set aside for its environmental and heritage values, or was before OCC had its plan of management altered to allow for the degradation and devastation of its values, but should nevertheless not be seen by Council as a tract of land for them to divvy up at will.

The SCA is the sum of all its parts, its ecosystems did not develop in isolation nor can they continue to do so once subjected to this proposal's very high magnitude of disturbance. It is sacred to local Wiradjuri aborigines, glowingly described by elder Neil Ingram Snr. as well as it being incredibly special to the local and wider community; the high energy sport of mountain biking is incompatible with these and should not be considered in Mount Canobolas SCA; high risk mountain bike trail development within the Mount Canobolas SCA is in direct conflict with and disrespectful of the aspirations of both. Already there are thousands of visitors to Mount Canobolas renowned and appreciated for its spectacular views and the quiet enjoyment of nature, with its selection of walking tracks and picnic facilities and opportunities for passive recreation. Mountain bike trails must be banned from Mount Canobolas SCA, the application for a SSD for 'tourism and recreation' to 'attract thousands of extra visitors to Orange', can equally be achieved with the project moved into state forest.

Council's Preliminary Environmental Impact Assessment has not been completed nor has approval been give to declare the proposal a SSD. If such approval is given Council still has to proceed to the EIS for further approval of the mountain bike proposal. By allocating \$1.5mil.. in 2034/24 draft budget the Council is reinforcing its determination to destroy the values for which the SCA was declared. This entire proposal could be transferred to state forest as mentioned above, so this sacred place can be preserved, protected and respected. Cultural, Heritage and Natural Environment of Gaanha-bula Mount Canobolas is paramount, these values must not be turned into a source of revenue for a few select businesses and mountain bikers.

Dr. Col Bower and Dr. Dick Medd have nominated through the NSW Biodiversity Conservation Act 2016 (BC Act) for Mount Canobolas State Conservation Area to be declared an Area of Outstanding Biodiversity Value (AOBV). The NSW Biodiversity Conservation Act 2016 (BC Act) provides legal protections for AOBVs and it would be of great benefit for Council to familiarise itself with this the nomination (available on the web) to see the extraordinary diversity that exists within the SCA and begin to understand that fragmenting and inevitably destroying elements of this diversity in construction of mountain bike trails would be a tragedy.

The allocation of \$1.5mil. appears to be an assertion from the Council that they are prepared to pursue the construction of mountain bike trails on Mount Canobolas in the expectation that DPIE will make a favourable decision as outlined in SEARS, and declare the proposal an SSD. The allocation for Mount Canobolas Mountain Bike Centre is money that will be spent in another jurisdiction, on land under the tenure of NPWS and cannot be claimed as an OCC asset. That is another of the reasons to object to the allocation of these funds in the draft budget 2023/24.

Cabonne LEP 2012 lists Mount Canobolas Parklands/Reserve as a significant Heritage item (item 1219), reference Schedule 5 of Cabonne LEP, being Environmental Heritage listing for Cabonne LGA. To OCC the land has no value other than an economic one, even though among its many other attributes, it supports the most diverse vegetation in the Central West.

It is disappointing and unsatisfactory that Council is still prepared to make funds available in order to pursue the exploitation of the natural resources of this precious and unique reserve Mount Canobolas State Conservation Area; to ignore climate change and fail to preserve and protect the environment. Council has the opportunity to take this proposal out of the political arena by showing integrity and return to its main function, administration of the LG Act in the Orange LGA.

Submission - Budget 2023/24

I am writing to the Council and all Councillors to voice allocating of \$1.5mil. in Council's Draft Budget for years 2023/24 for Mount Canobolas Mountain Bike Centre.

objects to the allocation of \$1.5mil in Draft Budget for 2023/24 for Mount Canobolas Mountain Bike Centre because:

- (a) Mount Canobolas Mountain Bike Centre proposal, if approved, will be located in Cabonne LGA on land whose tenure is with NPWS;
- (b) OCC abrogates all rights to ownership of trails, ancillary components, and all other items on which OCC funds will be spent if this proposal is approved and acted on;
- (c) OCC will have no obligation to maintain bike trails or ancillary components should the time come when mountain biking falls out of favour;
- (d) OCC does not have the mandate to use ratepayers money to put into an enterprise that is not on Council land;
- (e) OCC has not properly considered Additional Requirements in Appendix B DPIE Major Projects, for example justification of location of tracks in the SCA (reasons are very flimsy); long-term social impacts to Aboriginal communities and conservation groups; ongoing maintenance of tracks, and likely funding sources; proper assessment of risks to other park users and public risk management plan; lack of consideration of suitability of Tea House Picnic Area for visitor centre andfacilities; no reference to climate change;
- (f) Cabonne lists Mount Canobolas Parklands/Reserves as an item of local environmental heritage significant item (item 1219) in their LEP whereas OCC sees these precious lands as a site for tourism and recreation facilities, as stated in the

application for listing as State Significant Development, for a limited number of users, namely mountain bikers.

Cabonne Council has pointed out that 'bushfire risk' has not been addressed in Planning Proposal and Preliminary Environmental Assessment, nor does Planning Proposal reference Schedule 5 of Cabonne LEP, being Environmental Heritage listing for Cabonne LGA which includes Mount Canobolas Parklands/Reserve.

It is disappointing and unsatisfactory that Council is still prepared to continue making funds available in the draft budget 2023/24 in order to pursue the exploitation of the natural resources of this precious and unique reserve Mount Canobolas State Conservation Area; to ignore climate change and not conserve and protect the environment; in favour of a political agenda, sporting lobby group and the economic benefit of a few local businesses.

I oppose Orange City Council's mountain bike proposals on Mt Canobolas.

Your draft of the current CSP (Community Strategic Plan) shows that the protection of the environment and heritage is a clear priority for the Orange community, and Mt Canobolas is highly valued by the community as part of the natural environment, and is very special to the community and deserves protection. Yet mentions of the mountain bike park are listed as challenging these values.

Despite this, your budget documents propose that \$1.5 million be set aside in the financial year 2023-24 for the "Mt Canobolas Mountain Bike Centre". It appears that Concil has already spent over \$500,00 on ratepayers money on this proposal. The assessments required by the SEARS (Secretary's Environmental Assessment Requirements) on environmental, heritage, business, community, social and traffic implications, would be a huge drain on Orange ratepayer's money, (better spent on more pressing issues, eg roads).

The proposed bike tracks and subsequent foot traffic through the area will damage the endangered ecological communities and the unique biodiversity of the Mt Canobolas State Conservation Area, already compromised by the bushfires of early 2018

It will also damage the Wiradjuri cultural and spiritual heritage of the area.

State forests are very suitable for mountain bike tracks/parks, and being adjacent to Mt Canobolas SRA, easily accessable. There is no need for any disturbance to the SCA.

Submission to the Exhibition of the Community Strategic Plan and Budget

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Integrated Planning and Reporting Framework that is currently on exhibition.

I have 7 main issues that I want to comment on:

1. Demographics

It is disappointing that, in developing the CSP, Council has chosen to reduce the amount of information concerning the origins of migrants and people from Non-English-Speaking Backgrounds compared with previous plans. This information is important for community groups in planning relevant services to our local communities.

2. Homelessness and Housing Affordability

It is good to see the inclusion of the following new strategies in the Community Strategic Plan:

- 5.2 Support our homeless population and stop homelessness
- 5.3 Improve housing supply, diversity and affordability.

However, it is extremely disappointing that these strategies are not followed through with principal activities in the Delivery Program and actions in the Operational Plan. This tantamount to saying that Council intends to do absolutely nothing about implementing these strategies.

As there are many new Councillors, I do not know whether they realise this problem, but I do hope that changes will be made to the final plans before adoption by Council with Council taking responsibility for leading other partners to implement these strategies.

I would like to see Council taking more action to reduce the number of Short Term rentals in Orange as the purchase of family homes by investors is causing major challenges of affordability in purchasing or renting homes.

3. Proposed Mountain Bike Trails in the State Conservation Area on Mount Canobolas

I have worked in local government in England and NSW for over 30 years and I have never heard of one Council acting as a developer in another Council area. I am also concerned that Orange City Council made its application for State Significant Development in mid-January before Councillors were sworn in on 2nd February. Given that the building of MBTs in the SCA was a matter of considerable controversy during the local government elections, this action being taken when there was no Council appears to me to flout the concept of democracy.

I oppose the Council spending any more money on this proposal as the bike tracks will damage the unique Wiradjuri cultural and spiritual heritage of Gaanha-bula as well as damaging the unique biodiversity and endangered ecological communities. Despite statements to the contrary, there are alternative sites in the State Forests on Mount Canobolas that could be used for MBTs where it seems that car rallies have recently been held. The State Forests have already destroyed any cultural or biodiversity value. I find it very distressing that the views of the Gaanha-bula Action Group and Wiradjuri Elders are being ignored.

However, I still do not want to see \$1.5 million of Orange ratepayers money spent on further investigating this proposal as Orange City Council already has high rates and is proposing to raise the rates by the maximum allowable. The views of Cabonne Council on this proposed development in their local government area are not clear.

It seems that there is no business plan for this proposal and it does not fulfil the following guiding principles under the NSW Local Government Act:

Guiding principles for councils

Councils should carry out functions in a way that provides the best possible value for residents and ratepayers.

Councils should work co-operatively with other councils and the State government to achieve desired outcomes for the local community.

I have completed the survey on Council's Your Say page and I find it interesting that this proposal is not included in that survey.

Given the challenges that Orange is facing with the unaffordability of housing it is not clear to me that this tourist attraction is needed at this time.

4. Lack of Integration of CSP with Delivery Program and Operational Plan and lack of meaningful targets and measures

As noted above the strategies concerning housing are not followed through into the Delivery Program and Operational Plan. In fact, there seems to be very little integration between the strategies, principal activities and actions in general.

I attended one of the Forums that were held to discuss the development of the plans, and many of the comments made concerned the need for more meaningful targets, measures and reporting to improve Council's accountability to the community.

While there are some improvements in the Delivery Program and Operational Plan in that they are now separate documents and do detail who is responsible for the actions, the target and measures are mostly meaningless.

5. Exhibition of Budget is not understandable by the community and where is the Revenue Policy?

The way that the budget has been exhibited by Council is appalling. How can you expect ordinary members of the community to understand a series of financial tables?

It is a requirement for the Operational Plan to include Council's Statement of Revenue Policy, but it does not.

6. Where is the map showing the CBD Special Rates?

It is a legislative requirement to exhibit the map showing where the CBD Special Rate is implemented and yet again this is missing. The requirement is:

A map showing those parts of the LGA to which various rates will apply (including each category and sub-category of the ordinary rate and each special rate included in the OP) must be available on the council's website and available for public inspection at its office (and any other places it determines) during the exhibition of the OP.

7. Where are the continuous improvement proposals?

I have been unable to find Council's continuous improvement proposals that are a requirement:

To encourage continuous improvement across council's operations the Delivery Program must identify areas of service that the council will review during its term, and how others will be engaged to determine service level expectations and appropriate measures. It must address ongoing improvements to the efficiency, productivity, financial management and governance of the council.

I look forward to my comments being taken into consideration so that changes can be made prior to the adoption of Council's plans.

Protection of both tangible and intangible Wiradjuri heritage is noted in the Council's Delivery Plans, and any further development within the SCA would be in direct conflict with this goal.

There is no need to build in the SCA at all as there are suitable alternative sites available to mountain bikers in the adjoining State Forests.

Gaanha-bula /Mt Canobolas is incredibly special to the community and deserves protection

OCC are raising rates to the maximum amount allowable this year and it is inappropriate to put such an obscene amount of money towards a project that is outside the council boundaries and will be used by only a very small proportion of the population.

Over \$2m of ratepayers' money will have been spent just to find out if the proposal can go ahead.

This project represents a complete waste of ratepayers' money. The funds would be much better spent on

community facilities that can be used by everyone such as enhancement of walking tracks and parks and improvement of roads.

Again, I strongly object to any further money being spent on any proposal to place mountain bike trails in the Mt Canobolas State Conservation Area.

Draft Community Strategic Plan (CSP), Delivery Plan and Budgets

Dear Council members,

I am writing to you on behalf of the an association of environmental and bushwalking groups, scientists and concerned citizens in the Orange region.

Our purpose is for the protection of the Mt Canobolas State Conservation Area (SCA) from destructive development, most recently in the form of Orange City Council's (OCC) proposal to build a Mountain Bike Park there.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Draft Community Strategic Plan (CSP), Delivery Plan and Budgets currently on public display. The CSP is a mostly sound plan that documents the high value that the Orange community places on the local environment and heritage. These are rated as the most important reasons for living here. The Engagement Report highlights the "beautiful natural environment" as a significant factor.

However, we are most concerned about the mention of \$1.5 million in the proposed budget for FY 23/24 for a "Mt Canobolas Mountain Bike Trail Centre".

There is no information available for what this money is to be used for, however are we to assume that this is to satisfy the SEARS delivered recently by the NSW Dept of Planning? If so, this is a considerable amount of ratepayers money just to determine whether the project is feasible. It would not pay for the trails or any associated infrastructure to be built, and the final project would be contingent on already capricious external grant funding. We question whether Council can justify the expense for such an uncertain outcome.

Without a plausible business case, the believes strongly that this project in the SCA is **not** feasible; it would cause immense damage to a critical area; and should be <u>abandoned</u> for the following reasons:

There is no broad community support for the Mountain Bike Trail proposal

OCC, as the developer, does not have broad community support for this proposal. All public consultation in recent years, including responses to the National Parks and Wildlife Service draft Plan of Management, and an OCC Public Forum in 2021, indicated overwhelming opposition to it. Of the over 600 responses to the NPWS draft PoM, more than 70% were against the proposal. All of the substantive responses, including from the scientific community, were against the proposed tracks in the SCA (report obtained via GIPA application). OCC does not appear to have any census or poll indicating broad community support for the proposal.





The development is outside the LGA – why are Orange ratepayers paying for this?

All mention of Mt Canobolas should be removed from the CSP and accompanying documents because this is a location outside of the Orange LGA. Why is OCC devoting money to a proposal in an area where it does not have legislative rights? At a time where increased rates and charges are being heavily scrutinised, why is Orange ratepayers' money being considered for this proposal?

There is no up to date business case for it

The previous business case was a brief document designed to accompany the original idea from around 2015-16. The economics were speculative only and based on comparisons with other locations (e.g. Blue Derby) which are not comparable to our region. While mountain biking is an increasingly popular activity worldwide, it is almost never conducted in areas that aren't already disturbed. The financial offsets needed to account for loss of habitat alone (under State and Federal threatened species legislation) would make this project unviable even before it began. Maintenance and compliance costs are unknown, nor who would have responsibility for these.

There is no study of the negative impacts on other tourism

Mt Canobolas is already one of the most important tourist destinations in our region. Visitation is currently at an all-time high. Over 150,000 people visit Mount Canobolas SCA annually seeking expansive views, exercise on the walking tracks, quiet bushwalking, connection to Wiradjuri culture, relaxation from busy lives, bird watching, nature study, photography and much more. Most people value the quiet natural beauty of the cool mountain glades, and the grandeur of the views. In short, there are already many other users of the mountain who would be impacted by the proposed imposition of mountain bike trails. No study has been conducted on the impact that this proposal would have on these values and these tourists. Data from the NPWS indicates that only a tiny percentage of users of the State reserve system do so for biking. Why would we cater only for such a small group when other larger groups would potentially be disadvantaged?

There is no study of the impacts on health and emergency services from biking accidents

Published research shows that biking related injuries are very common and are a significant burden on health services. This is a social cost at a time when health services are struggling to keep up with current needs. Has OCC considered the insurance costs? Who pays for any accident caused by poorly constructed trails or poor maintenance? Emergency extractions from inaccessible locations within the SCA would also likely be difficult, costly and ultimately damaging to the environment.

The Mt Canobolas SCA has significant ecological, cultural and scientific value

Mt Canobolas is the highest point in central NSW and the SCA supports the last remnant of sub-alpine environment in this region.






- The reserve supports the only protected populations of ten species endemic to Mount Canobolas (ie. existing only here and nowhere else on Earth), some of which risk extinction if further losses of individuals occur.
- Over 1000 species of flora and fauna have so far been recorded in the SCA with many additional species being discovered annually. Invertebrates, bryophytes and fungi are particularly understudied. This total represents a very high species diversity for such a small reserve, with a number of these species notably vulnerable to ground level disturbance.
- About one fifth of species in the SCA are at the limits of their natural geographical ranges, some being disjunct populations likely to represent unique genetic variants.
- The woodland, forest and ground vegetation of the reserve comprises two Critically Endangered Ecological Communities and two Endangered Communities, one of which, the Mount Canobolas Xanthoparmelia Lichen Community, is endemic to the mountain and the only listed lichen community in Australia.
- Mt Canobolas is a lichen hotspot with over 100 recorded species, four of which occur nowhere else on Earth.
- The SCA is a ground orchid hotspot, with around **40** species, **two** of which are endemic.
- The reserve supports 18 recorded threatened species. The endemic Giles Mintbush, Prostanthera gilesii, found only in the SCA, is considered among the most endangered species in NSW. This species has already been declared an Asset of Intergenerational Significance (placing it on the same level as the iconic Wollemi Pine), under NSW legislation.
- The SCA meets criteria as an Area of Outstanding Biodiversity Value under the NSW Biodiversity Conservation Act, and is currently being assessed for this classification.

Gaanha-bula Mt Canobolas is a significant Wiradjuri cultural site

- The mountain areas include known initiation sites as well as occupation areas. Some of this knowledge is not in the public domain.
- There are now many thousands of Aboriginal cultural artefacts recorded within the SCA, many only recently exposed by the 2018 bushfire. These include tools used by both men and women.
- It is a place of immense spiritual and cultural significance and is linked to nearby Wahluu-Mt Panorama and Mt Macquarie via a dreaming story.
- Every metre of proposed trail would require detailed excavation to assess for Aboriginal cultural artefacts. Any artefacts found would require removal if the trails go ahead. This represents a permanent impact on aboriginal cultural heritage in an area that has had long term protection and relative lack of disturbance prior to this.





All trails cause ecological and cultural damage

- There is considerable global scientific evidence and literature, published over many decades, that highlights the environmental impacts of trail creation and use. These include:
 - Soil erosion
 - Water contamination
 - Habitat fragmentation and removal
 - o Pest, disease and weed invasion
 - o Potential species extinction. This is particularly concerning in reserves that are 'landlocked' or limited in size or physiography and with minimal ecological buffering in a highly cleared landscape.
 - Increased fire risk
- Recent literature and evidence about the impacts of mountain biking specifically, indicates permanent impacts on landscapes. Mountain bikers themselves call their sport "shredding".
- Construction of more than 70km of track would expose and permanently disturb around 50 football field's worth of ground, mostly on steep slopes vulnerable to erosion.
- While some species may be able to adjust to the trails, others will not, and cultural artefacts would be permanently displaced.

Recent consultancies did not capture the true picture

- There were many concerns raised in the scientific and local Wiradjuri communities about the engagement process of the consultants hired by OCC for the purposes of developing an application for State Significant Development.
- While attempts were made to capture available information, desktop studies do not provide the complete picture of the ecology of a location. The ecological field activities of the consultants were brief and limited by the terms of the tender. A true indication of the environmental impact would require field examination over many seasons and possibly years, especially in such a vulnerable location.
- There were many errors in interpretation and omissions from the submitted documents. These included:
 - Poor recognition of the damage caused by mountain bike trail creation and usage. Recent scientific literature on this was either ignored or mis-interpreted. It is critical in any assessment of environmental impact that the source of potential impact be well documented and examined thoroughly. This was only minimally done.
 - o No appreciation of the combined effects of climate change and the proposal on ecological values.
 - o Inadequate methodology and field assessment of cultural artefacts, with concerns raised by RAPs (Registered Aboriginal Parties) about the rapidity of field assessments and inadequate field sampling.

Response from Dept of Planning (the SEARS)

While the proposal met initial criteria to be considered for State significance (mostly due to cost and potential environmental impact), the SEARS highlighted many areas where the proponents needed to provide considerably more information before it could be assessed. These requirements included a detailed Environmental Impact Assessment, more detailed Cultural heritage assessment, a Business case, social impact study and traffic study – all to be conducted by qualified professionals. This would be incredibly costly. The \$500 000 already voted by the previous Council for consultancies was meant to get the project to "shovel-ready" status (see tender documents). The SEARS indicates that the proposal is nowhere near this point, and Council should now reconsider their support for the expenditure of any more Orange rate money on this project. The potential costs are escalating and the outcomes even more tenuous. Councillors have a duty of care to use public money wisely and this project does not warrant any further expenditure on it.

Alternatives exist

There are more than 10000ha of State Forests surrounding the Mt Canobolas SCA that would provide more suitable locations for a mountain bike park. Indeed the Orange Mountain Bike Club has been successful in obtaining 2 grants to support their trail development there (most recently for their "Trail of Awesomeness"). They are already well catered for, with nearby locations (e.g. Lake Canobolas Bike Park) also devoted to this sport.

The Forestry Corporation submission in the SEARS indicates their overall support for the proposal within their tenure. They mention the potential difficulty of track destruction each harvest cycle, with the best case scenario being 30 years and the worst 15 years (not every 7 years as claimed by Cr Hamling in the media). Even a 15 year lifespan for an individual trail is going to be sufficient, given the damage that is caused by constant usage, and the need to rejuvenate worn tracks regularly. 30 years is a long lifetime for a mountain bike track, but not for biodiversity. The most important statement is this: "State Forests are a very suitable tenure to host such a proposal and as mentioned Forestry Corporation is very supportive of this proposal". This negates any argument put by OCC or consultants (in their Scoping Document) that the State Forests can't be used (and therefore the SCA must be used).

It is our view that a more suitable location for the mountain bike park lies in the adjacent State Forests, however this too requires a detailed business case as well as environmental and cultural assessments.

We request that this proposal in the SCA be **abandoned** and, in line with broader community wishes, the \$1.5 million noted in the forward budgets be re-allocated to projects within the OCC LGA that would benefit the wider Orange community.

FORMAL SUBMISSION ON THE DRAFT BUDGET 202-23 and ATTENDANT DOCUMENTS.

I refer to p 12 of the Capital Program 2022/23-2031/32, Summary-Live General Fund.

The item I am commenting on is for *Mount Canobolas – Mountain Bike Trail Centre*. The proposed budget for 2023/2024 indicates an expenditure for \$1,500,000. There is no detail in any of the documents and it is difficult to ascertain if this refers to work on the existing Lake Canobolas Mountain Bike Park or to the proposed mountain bike tracks on Mount Canobolas.

If the proposed allocation of funds is to further the attempt to build mountain bike tracks on Mt. Canobolas then I object to our ratepayer funds being made available for this purpose.

The building of the tracks and the biking activity are not compatible with the preservation of the environment of the State Conservation Area or with that of the Wiradjuri heritage.

Insufficient funding for roadworks on Forest Road, Whiley Road and Worboys Street Spring Hill

The 2022/23 budget allocates \$800,000 to **Forest Road**. It is not stated as to what section of **Forest Road** this money is to be spent, or what type of work is required. However, as a local resident who uses the road regularly the amount of money allocated is far too little for the work that is required.


On **Forest Road** from Spring Terrace to Spring Hill there remains sections of road pavement that require urgent attention. At a cost of \$1 Million a kilometre to rebuild a modern roadway, the budgeted amount is clearly inadequate. The pavement is badly broken, uneven, and poorly drained.

Forest Road, along with **Worboys Street** (in Spring Hill Village) and **Whiley Road** east of Spring Hill are major thorough fares for heavy vehicles to Cadia Mine, particularly the trucks taking blue metal aggregate from Shadforth quarry to the mine on a daily basis. Spring Hill also has other local quarries that service the Orange district via these roads. These roads where not built for the long-term use by heavy vehicles and with recent wet weather are deteriorating to the point of being dangerous to drive along in a small vehicle. They need to be reinforced and resurfaced.


The importance of this traffic corridor to the local economy, village residents and Cadia Mine is continually underestimated by Orange City Council and the NSW Government. Much more funding is required to be made available to upgrade and then maintain these roads.

Roadworks of recent years are already deteriorating, and a "quick fix here and there" is not working as pavement on recent roadwork carried out on Forest Road near Spring Hill is already failing.

Another budget (12 Months) without adequate funding for these roads will only highlight Councils neglect of the Spring Hill area, so please reconsider the 2022/23 budget in regard to better funding for **Forest Road**, along with **Worboys Street** (in Spring Hill Village) and **Whiley Road**.

Indeed, the Forestry Corporation, in its response to Council's request for SEARS, stated "State Forests are a very suitable tenure for this type of proposal". Furthermore, Orange Mt Bike Club has recently received funding to build their "Trail of Awesomeness" in the State Forests. Clearly, they too believe that the State Forests are suitable. There is no need to build in the SCA at all.

How can OCC propose \$1.5 million for the bike track proposal when no updated business case for it has been released?

There is no mention of what the \$1.5 million will be used for. Over \$500,000 has already been spent with much more to be spent to meet the SEARS requirements. This means that over \$2m of ratepayers' money will have been spent just to find out if the proposal can go ahead. This represents a waste of ratepayers' money at a time when there is considerable debate in local media about council's rates and fees.

OCC are raising rates to the maximum amount allowable this year and it is inappropriate to put this amount towards a project that will be used by only a small proportion of the population.

The funds would be much better spent on community facilities that can be used by everyone such as enhancement of walking tracks and parks and improvement of roads. Construction of the tracks (if approved) would involve considerably more money than this (\$10s of millions if ongoing maintenance is considered). Who pays for this?

The OCC proposal is for a bike track development on land outside their council area and on land where OCC has no jurisdiction. Why spend Orange ratepayer's money outside the council boundaries?

While it is important to look forward and plan the City's future, we should not be doing this considering our environment and protecting Wiradjuri cultural and spiritual heritage.

I write to express my concern over an amount of \$1.5 million for the 2023–2024 budget identified in the draft Council Strategic Plan to progress mountain biking in the Cabonne Shire. Mountain biking in many parts of our region is to be encouraged but the Mt Canobolas State Conservation Area needs to be left out of any such plans. Any proposal to establish mountain bike trails within such a conservation area shows little regard for the purpose the SCA was established.

Conservation has a very important meaning for this protected part of Mt Canobolas and sporting activities such as mountain biking are very much a threat to the conservation intent of the SCA. The area that the SCA is intended to protect has never been cleared and therefore contains intact ecosystem linkages that have developed and evolved over millions of years (the last eruption of Mt Canobolas being around 11 million years ago). These ecological linkages will largely be broken if a network of cleared ground is added to the SCA, particularly through fragmentation of the ground level environment. Invertebrates in particular will be negatively impacted by this fragmentation and it is the invertebrates which drive the ecological processes in such natural areas. Some of these creatures and a number of species of plants and lichens living in the SCA are found nowhere else on Earth making our Mt Canobolas SCA comparable to such revered places as the Galapagos Islands and Madagascar.

Conservation of natural areas has certain requirements, particularly <u>minimising</u> human impact, while recreation has other requirements making it incompatible with conservation. It is up to us to ensure that these rare natural remnants are preserved from inappropriate development which will fragment and degrade the ecosystems. Your own draft Council Strategic Plan has identified preservation of the environment and heritage as the highest priority of the ratepayers of our city.

While I generally believe that the above plan is a worthy document, when reading the accompanying **Draft 2022-23 Budget**, there is one detail that gives me great concern – the proposed \$1.5 million dollars under the Line-Item 'Mt Canobolas- Mountain Bike Trail Centre'. The absence of any business plan in regard to mountain bikes in the Mount Canobolas area makes it impossible to determine what this item actually is. How is it intended that the funds be expended?

I believe that <u>Orange City Council has already spent too much money on the proposal for Mountain Bike Trails</u> in the Mt Canobolas State Conservation Area. The additional \$1.5 million will quickly disappear into the Secretary's Environmental Assessment Requirements (SEARs) process. While future stages of the (MBT) development may well be dependent on the receipt of grants, Council resources will be needed to prepare, submit and administer those grants; all for a development <u>on land that is not owned or administered by Orange City Council!</u>

Council has in the past failed to raise funds to properly maintain and develop existing facilities, such as Orange Showground and the Orange Function Centre. Why spend the funds OUTSIDE Council's domain when that money would make a big difference to facilities already owned by the community?

The Community Strategic Plan identifies the desire for better environmental stewardship and greater care for the Mt Canobolas & Lake Canobolas areas, as well as a desire for more mountain bike tracks. The development of mountain bike trails within the State Conservation Area (by any authority or organisation) would be in direct conflict with stewardship aspirations: the Orange Mountain Bike Club has already demonstrated that excellent mountain bike trails can be created in the vicinity, and without threat to, or loss of, the ecologically significant flora and fauna that is currently protected within the Mt Canobolas State Conservation Area.

Further pursuit of establishing mountain bike trails within the State-owned Mt Canobolas State Conservation Area will not only divert Council funds from existing community owned facilities, it will prevent the exploration of alternative, more sustainable, income generating activities. The Mt Canobolas State Conservation Area is already a destination for tourists, walkers, road cyclists, runners, educational institutions, ornithologists and botanists; there are many avenues to explore in regards to developing and enhancing these visitors' experiences, rather than diminishing/destroying the very features that attract them.

I am writing to you on behalf of to express our opposition to the allocation in the Orange City Council draft budget 2023/4 of 1.5 million dollars for the purpose of further pursuing the proposed mountain bike trail network within the Mount Canobolas State Conservation Area.

The draft of the Community Strategic Plan currently on exhibition for public comment clearly identifies the protection of our environment and heritage as a major priority. Mt. Canobolas rates several mentions as an area that needs to be preserved for its environmental and heritage value. References to the mountain bike track in this document relating to Mt Canobolas rate it as a challenge to its environmental values. The message delivered via extensive public consultation is that the mountain bike track is perceived not as an asset, but a threat to the environmental priorities clearly supported by our community.

The fully supports the statement identifying Mt. Canobolas as an area which requires preservation for both its environmental and heritage value. We also agree that the establishment of a mountain bike trail network on the mountain would be a threat to its environmental and heritage value.

It is unacceptable that Council should proceed with this funding, and not heed the obvious opposition to inappropriate development in the area, which has been clearly expressed by a majority of those consulted.

It is possible that a large amount of the money allocated by Council to the mountain bike proposal could be spent on completing the assessments required by the Secretary's Environmental Assessment Requirements (SEARS). \$500 000 has already been allocated to meet environmental requirements for the proposal. If the proposed 1.5 million is to meet the remaining requirements, including that of a business plan, it would mean that two million dollars of ratepayers' money will be spent before the project is approved. On

top of this would be the considerable sum required to develop and maintain the track, also paid for by the ratepayer.

Allocating ratepayers' money for SEARS requirements could be avoided by locating the entire bike trail network in the State Forest. This alternative is supported by the Forestry Corporation which has identifies the state forest as being an appropriate site for mountain bike trail network.

1.5 million dollars of ratepayers' money would be much better spent on projects that benefit the entire community, not just a small percentage of the cycling fraternity. It could also go towards conserving and maintaining the existing environmental and heritage values identified and prioritized by the community through the CSP consultation process.

I have been a proud Orange resident and ratepayer since 1999. My two children were raised in Orange and I continue to enjoy living and working in this beautiful region.

Ever since I moved to Orange, I have regularly visited Mt Canobolas with my children, extended family members, and visitors from outside the region and overseas. I continue to regularly visit the mountain with friends and walkers to walk, picnic, and sight see. Our family has celebrated birthdays, Mothers Day and other special get togethers in numerous stunning locations in the State Conservation Area.

We have had special sightings of echidnas, wallabies and wombats, we have enjoyed the magic of the snow falls, and the beauty of the spring wildflowers. We have stood on the summit to photograph the glorious sunsets over the western plains.

I strongly oppose the spending of any further rate payer funds on a proposal to build mountain bike trails through the middle of this special place. What chance will the echidnas, delicate spring flowers,

fungi and mosses have in the face of a major building site, heavy and ongoing mountain bike traffic and permanent irretrievable damage to the untouched nature of the State Conservation Area?

Mountain Bike riding is a lot of fun and should be promoted in the region. There are a multitude of alternate sites for exhilarating trails to be constructed in the adjoining State Forests. Those areas do not have the wide range of native flora and fauna to be found in the State Conservation Area but in all respects are entirely suitable for a wide variety of downhill trails.

SUBMISSION RE. BUDGET 23/24 for the Mt Canobolas/Gaanha-bula Bike Centre

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Budget 2022. My submission relates to the proposed expenditure of \$1.5million for the 23/24 financial year for a Mountain Bike Centre on Mount Canobolas/Gaanha-bula. It appears this budget allocation has been predicted in the absence of a Business Case therefore the strategic, economic, financial, commercial and management analysis are not evident, which in itself is concerning.

The <u>cultural significance</u> of Mount Canobolas/Gaanha-bula mentioned in OCC Community Strategic Plan is welcomed. OCC has demonstrated the important history and culture of the Wiradjuri peoples in past strategies and commissioned the Orange Aboriginal Heritage Report 2012 (NTSCORP) which acknowledged the "two main peaks (Old Man Canobolas and Young Man Canobolas) as a major Wiradjuri ceremonial site." The proposal for bike trails appears to disregard the cultural significance to contemporary Wiradjuri peoples through Dreaming stories shared within. The NTSCORP report concluded that First Peoples likely camped on the mountain, pre the occupation of Europeans. How will this important aspect be preserved and respected? What lengths has OCC undertaken to consult with Wiradjuri elders to protect their heritage?

Mount Canobolas/Gaanha-bula is an area of <u>environmental biodiversity and endangered species</u> eg. the unique Canobolas Candlebark (eucalyptus canobolensis). What measures will OCC undertake to ensure the flora and fauna of the area is not destroyed by bike tracks, spectators, media etc?

<u>As a tourist destination</u> Mount Canobolas/Gaanha-bula area is already a primary site enjoyed by many visitors, currently confined to vehicles on designated roads and walkers on much enjoyed hiking trails. Cabonne Council currently funds and manages this area, has vast experience and knowledge about the impacts of human traffic in the vicinity especially during fluctuating weather events. How has Cabonne Council been included in this proposal give the budgetary impacts this would have on its ratepayers?

<u>Climate change</u> will further impact on the accessibility and risk management of Mount Canobolas/Gaanhabula with predictions of further threats of bush fire, flooding and drought. Increased human traffic on proposed bike trails may create further risk to wildlife, rare fauna and damage to historical artefacts.

An <u>alternative site</u>, in the <u>adjoining state forest</u> has been identified by The Forestry Corporation. This option would appear to be ideal especially as it has recently been cleared and has established tracks. It is understood the Orange Bike Club has received funding to build a trail in the forest so it would be logical and cost effective to expand on that work in the State Forest and preserve Mount Canobolas/Gaanha-bula as an area of cultural, community and environment significance.

Cancer Council NSW is committed to reducing the impact of cancer on individuals and the community. We are community funded and community focused. We believe health is central to urban planning that can create environments that promote cancer-smart behaviours and reduce exposure to known cancer risks such as solar ultraviolet (UV) radiation.

This submission outlines the importance of the role of built and natural shade in helping to protect the community from over-exposure to UV radiation, and makes specific suggestions for inclusion of shade and UV radiation issues in Council's CSP

As a Community Programs Coordinator at Cancer Council NSW along with being a Western Region resident living and working in the area., I am committed to driving positive and lasting change towards a cancer free future for our local communities. One of the priority cancer prevention advocacy areas our organisation is committed to is skin cancer prevention, and the provision of quality shade in priority locations plays a critical role in reducing this risk.

Skin cancer in Australia and in your local government area

Australia has the highest levels of UV radiation and the highest incidence rates of skin cancer worldwide, where two out of every three people are likely to be diagnosed with skin cancer by the age of 70. UV radiation from the sun causes 95% of melanomas and 99% of non-melanoma skin cancers in Australia. This means skin cancer is highly preventable.

The importance of shade in reducing the risk of skin cancer

Quality shade, which is defined as a well-designed and correctly positioned combination of natural and built shade, can reduce solar UV radiation exposure by up to 75%. This makes shade a critical component to reducing overall skin cancer risk. Shade availability and accessibility are key to shade use; it needs to be readily available across a range of outdoor spaces where children and adults live, work and play.

Councils have a responsibility for a range of health promoting activities intended to benefit their communities. Facilitating sun protection through thoughtful planning and designing of effective shade forms part of these responsibilities.



Prioritising natural shade for UV protection will also assist Council in achieving NSW Government urban heat management and healthy built environment priorities including:

Achieving proposed tree canopy targets outlined in the draft NSW Urban Design Guide

Re: Objection to Budget allocation for Mt Canobolas Mountain Bike Centre

I wish to object to the allocation of \$1.5 million in FY23/24 for a Mt Canobolas Mountain Bike Centre in the Live – (General Fund) of the Capital Program 2022/23 – 2031/32.

The proposal to establish mountain bike trails on Gaanha-bula Mt Canobolas is in direct opposition to very important elements in the Draft Orange Community Strategic Plan 2022 - 2032 which, in the words of Mayor Cr Jason Hamling, "outlines the whole-of-community shared vision for our city's future". (Message from the Mayor, Draft Orange CSP)

The community vision set out in the CSP ranks ten strengths that make Orange a great place to live. First and foremost, with a strength of 10.4%, ahead of other strengths such as Lifestyle and Location and convenience, is our Beautiful natural environment.

Gaanha-bula Mt Canobolas is listed first as one of the places and values such as clean fresh air, trees, bushland and beautiful rural location that are our strengths.

The CSP also acknowledges that one of the challenges facing our vision of Environmental sustainability is 'bike tracks on Mt Canobolas Gaanha-bula'.

It is therefore contradictory that the current Orange City Council budget plan allocates \$1.5 million to a Mt Canobolas Mountain Bike Centre when our Draft CSP clearly recognises:

- Gaanha-bula Mt Canobolas as a strength of our Beautiful natural environment, and
- bike tracks on Gaanha-bula Mt Canobolas as a challenge to Environmental sustainability.

For these reasons, without Council having provided any intent for the use of these funds, I wish to object to the allocation of \$1.5 million to the Mt Canobolas Mountain Bike Centre.

I would also like to say that further expenditure on bike trails on Gaanha-bula Mt Canobolas both corrupts and makes a farce of the spirit and the intent of our community participating in the development of a Community Strategic Plan.

Re: Orange City Council's Draft Community Strategic plan and Mountain Bike proposal on Gaanha-bula (Mount Canobolas)

My name is _____, and I am a proud Wiradjuri Elder.

I am an active Wiradjuri Leader and Member of the Aboriginal and wider communities of Orange. I have lived, worked, and performed voluntary work in Orange and the region for some 40 plus years.

Today, I am writing to you to express my concern for the Draft Community Strategic Plan and my objection to the proposed Mountain Bike track on Gaanha-bula (Mt Canobolas). I oppose this proposal in its entirety.

I was very pleased when Orange City Council recently asked the community for their comments to help build their Community Strategic Plans. The community have spoken, they have said that Gaanha-bula (Mt Canobolas) is of importance to them, that protection of Cultural, Heritage, and Natural Environment is paramount as stated in the current draft Community Strategic Plan. We need to protect Gaanha-bula for all people.

But to the Wiradjuri people, Gaanha-bula means much more than that.

- This is our dreaming place. It is significant to the Dreaming story, which is embedded within our culture, belief, practices and tradition.
- We have a spiritual connection to this sacred place. The proposal doesn't reflect the true picture of the Spiritual Significance of Gaanha-bula (Mt Canobolas). This has been lost in the proposal.
- Huge damage to soil and vegetation will be caused by trails and there will be erosion that will spread beyond the tracks and damage our environmentally sensitive area.
- Our Tangible and Intangible Heritage needs to be always protected.
- Tourism and education being away to have employment can happen in any other area including the state forest but not on Gaanha bula (Mt Canobolas). Orange City Council need to look at other opportunities to attract tourism.
- Our ancestors have continuous occupation and connection to this country for over 75,000 years.
- We are not against mountain bike riding, but we are against it on Gaanha-bula, our sacred place.
- It is not about the size/elevation of the mountain, but what is in it, and around it, that matters to our people.
- We want the protection of the entire mountain and not just for registered sites or any sections to be open for abuse and degradation.

We need to preserve, protect, and respect this sacred place.

I was deeply disappointed when I read that Orange City Council have set aside \$1.5 million in the 2023/24 financial year budget for the Mountain Bike Track. What is this money being used for? To complete assessments still required for the proposal.

This Mountain Bike track is going to be a very expensive hobby/exercise for a select few! Orange City Council have already spent approximately \$500,000 of rate payers' money to date.

Our yearly rates cost is about to increase to the maximum amount allowed, with this waste of money, around \$2million before the Mountain Bike Track starts to be built, I can understand why this rate rise is needed!

What I am not able to understand is, why are you willing to desecrate the Wiradjuri people's sacred and significant dreaming place, which stands on land outside of Orange City Council boundaries, with great expense to all? To the Wiradjuri people this great expense is not about \$\$\$. For Aboriginal people it is about protecting our sacred place.


Once again, community consultation does not account for much with Orange City Council, other than the effort the Community puts in to have their say/opinion.

Re: Response to the draft 2022-2032 Community Strategic Plan (CSP)

Thank you for the opportunity to provide feedback on the draft CSP.

Cancer Council NSW is committed to reducing the impact of cancer on individuals and the community. We are community funded and community focused. We believe health is central to urban planning that can create environments that promote cancer-smart behaviours and reduce exposure to known cancer risks such as solar ultraviolet (UV) radiation.

This submission outlines the importance of the role of built and natural shade in helping to protect the community from over-exposure to UV radiation, and makes specific suggestions for inclusion of shade and UV radiation issues in Council's draft CSP.

Cancer Council NSW works closely with key stakeholders to reduce the incidence of skin cancer by improving access to adequate shade in NSW. Cancer Council NSW is a key partner in the implementation of the <u>NSW Skin Cancer Prevention Strategy</u> (2017) which defines a comprehensive approach to reducing overexposure to UV radiation and ultimately the incidence of skin cancer in NSW. The Strategy is a multidisciplinary initiative lead by the Cancer Institute NSW which is an agency of NSW Health.

Skin cancer in Australia and in your local government area

Australia has the highest levels of UV radiation and the highest incidence rates of skin cancer worldwide, where two out of every three people are likely to be diagnosed with skin cancer by the age of 70. UV radiation from the sun causes 95% of melanomas and 99% of non-melanoma skin cancers in Australia. This means skin cancer is highly preventable. In the Orange LGA, the age-standardised incidence rate of melanoma between 2013 and 2017 was 66.5 per 100,000 population, which is higher than the NSW average rate.¹

The importance of shade in reducing the risk of skin cancer

Quality shade, which is defined as a well-designed and correctly positioned combination of natural and built shade, can reduce solar UV radiation exposure by up to 75%. This makes shade a critical component to reducing overall skin cancer risk. Shade availability and accessibility are key to shade use; it needs to be readily

- Recognise that quality shade is an asset that is critical to ensuring the health, comfort and well-being of your community.
- The commitment to plan and budget properly in advance for built and natural shade in public spaces including playgrounds, parks, recreation and sporting facilities, active travel networks and town centres.





Externally restricted funds are those funds that have been received for a specific purpose and may only be used for the purpose that they have been received, for example, the money received for Water access and usage charges by legislation are only available to be spent for the operation, maintenance, and expansion of the Water supply network.

Internally restricted funds are those that Council has earmarked for a particular purpose, but Council can have that purpose changed.

Unrestricted funds are those available for use to continue the day-to-day operations of Council, made up of General Fund investments and cash only.

The unrestricted cash position movements during the month are normal as projects commence and income is received. Movements may also arise following processing of income received between funds or into restricted assets to appropriately allocate for the purposes Council has determined. Council's cash flow is monitored daily, and some investments may be redeemed rather than rolled over to support operational requirements.



Portfolio Advice


Council utilises the services of an independent investment advisor in maintaining its portfolio of investments. Council's current investment advisor is Imperium Markets, an independent asset consultant that works with wholesale investors to develop, implement and manage their investment portfolio. Imperium Markets is a leading provider of independent investment consulting services to a broad range of institutional investors including government agencies, superannuation funds and not-for-profit organisations.



Portfolio Performance

Council's current Long Term Financial Plan establishes the benchmark for Council's interest on investments at "75 basis points above the current cash rate". The cash rate as of 31 May 2022 has increased at 0.35 per cent. The weighted average interest rate of Council's investment portfolio at the same reporting date was 1.38 per cent which continues to exceed Council's benchmark i.e., the cash rate of 0.35 per cent plus 0.75 per cent (or 111 basis points).



Council has also utilised the AusBond Bank Bill Index to provide a further benchmark focused on long term investments. As of 31 May 2022, the AusBond rate was 0.90 per cent. The weighted average interest rate of Council's investment portfolio at the same reporting date was 1.38 per cent.



Council's Investment Policy establishes limits in relation to the maturity terms of Council's investments as well as the credit ratings of the institutions with whom Council can invest.

The following tables provide a dissection of Council's investment portfolio as required by the Policy. The Policy identifies the maximum amount that can be held in a variety of investment products or with institutions based on their respective credit ratings.

Table 1 shows the percentage held by Council (holdings) and the additional amount that Council could hold (capacity) for each term to maturity allocation in accordance with limits established by Council's Policy.

Table 2 shows the total amount held, and the weighted average interest rate (or return on investment), by credit rating. The credit rating is an independent opinion of the capability and willingness of a financial institution to repay its debts, or in other words, the providers' financial strength or creditworthiness. The rating is typically calculated as the likelihood of a failure occurring over a given period, with the higher rating (AAA) being superior due to having a lower chance of default. However, it is generally accepted that this lower risk will be accompanied by a lower return on investment.

The level of money held in the bank accounts has been added to the table to illustrate the ability of Council to cover the operational liabilities that typically occur (for example payroll, materials and contracts, utilities).

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This report is to provide Council with information so that they can consider two applications for funding in Council's Small Donations & Grants Program (Round 4): Glenroi Heights Public School's Swimming Project and Regional Development Australia Central West's Ten-for-Ten Leadership program.

LINK TO DELIVERY/OPERATIONAL PLAN

The recommendation in this report relates to the Delivery/Operational Plan strategy "15.2 Collaborate - Support community organisations and groups to deliver services and programs".

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The budget for General Donations within the Small Donations & Grants Program for 2021/2022 is \$60,000.00. \$46,345.45 has been expended to date, so these grants are within the program allocation.

- 1 \$2, 500 in funding for Glenroi Heights Public School's Swimming Program to provide the school with a pool of swimwear and towels that students can borrow as needed.
- 2 \$1,500 (plus GST) in funding for Regional Development Australia Central West's Tenfor-Ten Leadership program to cover some of the costs of the program.

FURTHER CONSIDERATIONS

Consideration has been given to the recommendation's impact on Council's service delivery; image and reputation; political; environmental; health and safety; employees; stakeholders and project management; and no further implications or risks have been identified.

SUPPORTING INFORMATION

1. Glenroi Heights Public School's application for funding is for \$2, 500 for their Swimming Program to provide the school with a pool of swimwear and towels that students can borrow as needed.

Over the last two years, due to Covid, Glenroi Heights Public School's students have not participated in their Swim School program (10 days over 2 weeks) and therefore have very limited swimming abilities. Out of the 110 students recently assessed, only 10 have participated in swimming lessons (less than 10%) and all students are swimming below a level 3. This means students cannot meet the benchmark for 12 years of age, and over half of students attending cannot meet the benchmarks for 6-year-olds. Additionally, 50% of the school's students identify as Aboriginal, and statistics show that Aboriginal people are 2.9 times more likely to drown than non-Aboriginal people.

As a result, the school has urgently sort to engage their students in swim lessons, partnering with the Orange Aquatic Centre to support them. Students are supported by trained swim teachers (trained school staff and aquatic centre staff), as well as some other teachers and School Learning Support Officers (SLSOs) who are upskilled to teach Level One students. Students in Years 3 to 6 have been participating so far in 2022, and Year 2 students will participate in Term 4. Currently, classes occur weekly in class time. The program is running in Terms 2, 3 & 4 for 2022, and it is anticipated that it will run over all terms in 2023.

The Orange Aquatic Centre support the school's program with staffing, timetabling, goggle hire and training teaching staff. Newcrest Cadia have contributed \$10,000 to the program, which will be used to subsidise the bus transport to and from the pool in 2022-23. It costs \$3.50 per child per entry to the aquatic centre and for those children who cannot afford the fee, the school covers this.

Some children come from families who cannot afford swimmers and towels, or they forget to bring them on the required days. The school would like to start a clothing-pool of swimwear and towels that students can borrow as needed, and this is what this request for funding would cover (see attached application form).

2. Regional Development Australia Central West's request for \$1, 500 (plus GST) is to cover some of the costs of their Ten-for-Ten Leadership program.

Regional Development Australia Central West (RDA) is a not-for-profit organisation aiming to maximise economic development opportunities across the NSW Central West region.

The Ten4Ten Leadership Dialogue Program connects ten selected Year 11 students with ten local community leaders for a unique mentoring experience. The Central West is home to a high calibre of leaders, and mentoring plays a significant role in fostering the next generation of young leaders in our community. Since its inception in 2020, the TEN4TEN Leadership Dialogue has 'forged new partnerships, opened doors, and provided insight into the countless opportunities available in the Central West' https://rdacentralwest.org.au/projects/ten4ten-2022/.

Successful applicants will have the opportunity to take part in the following:

- 1. Attend the program launch and dinner in early April and participate in the speed networking activity with all mentors
- 2. Afternoon tea at Orange City Council Chambers
- 3. Visit the Parliament of NSW in Sydney
- 4. Visit the Parliament of Australia in Canberra
- 5. Attend the end of program breakfast and presentation in November; and
- 6. Take part in additional events throughout the program.

RDA is also requesting the same amount from each of the Blayney and Cabonne Councils. Seven of the 11 students in this year's program are from Orange (see attached application form).

At Glenroi Heights Public School we provide a supportive learning environment where all students feel a sense of success and belonging. We foster individual growth and inclusivity where students take pride in their learning and their school. Glenroi Heights Public School fosters a collaborative and respectful setting where all staff constantly strive to improve their practice to support our students and each other. Community connectedness is an important part of our school culture and we seek the voice of students, parents, community partners and our local AECG to ensure we are working together to create positive future stories for our students.

Glenroi Heights Public School is situated in the city of Orange, New South Wales on the land of the Wiradjuri. The school provides a dynamic, focused curriculum to meet the diverse needs of our students. The school population fluctuates between 220 and 250 students, 50% identify as Aboriginal. We have nine mainstream classes and five classes to support students with special needs. We work hard to provide an integrated setting for all students and we promote quality teaching and learning across all key learning areas. The school culture is built on the values of Respect, Responsibility, Cooperation and Safety.

Glenroi Heights Public School is dedicated to educating the whole student. We believe educational experiences transcend outside of the classroom environment and are committed to supporting our students to be lifelong learners, productive members of society and have the skills to be confident and capable adults. Over the last 2 years, due to Covid, our students have not participated in Swim School (10days over 2 weeks) program and therefore have very limited swimming abilities. Out of the 110 students attending, only 10 have participated in swimming lessons (less than 10%) and all students are swimming below a level 3. This means students cannot meet the benchmark for 12years of age, and over half of students attending cannot meet the benchmarks for 6-year-olds.

The Who: We have engaged with Orange Aquatic Centre to support our students. Students are supported by trainer swim teachers, both on our own staff and within the aquatic centre, as well as teachers and SLSOs who are upskilled to teach Level One students. Students in years 3 to 6 are participating, with the addition of year 2 students in Term 4. 110 students have opportunity to access this program at GHPS.

Weekly, Mondays 1-2pm, in-class time to support our community. Terms 2, 3 & 4 for 2022 and all Terms for 2023. Possibly 2 alternative Terms moving past there

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Orange City Council engaged Urban Enterprise to develop the 2022–2026 Orange Region Destination Management Plan (DMP) for the Blayney, Cabonne and Orange LGAs. Orange City Council has worked collaboratively with Blayney and Cabonne Councils and engaged actively with the tourism industry and key stakeholders to develop this Plan.

It is recommended that the draft Orange Region Destination Management Plan (attached) is endorsed by Council and placed on public exhibition for a period of 28 days. This is subject to all three Councils endorsing the draft DMP and place it on public exhibition.

LINK TO DELIVERY/OPERATIONAL PLAN
