# 1.2 Declaration of pecuniary interests, significant non-pecuniary interests and less than significant non-pecuniary interests

The provisions of Chapter 14 of the Local Government Act, 1993 (the Act) regulate the way in which Councillors and designated staff of Council conduct themselves to ensure that there is no conflict between their private interests and their public role.

The Act prescribes that where a member of Council (or a Committee of Council) has a direct or indirect financial (pecuniary) interest in a matter to be considered at a meeting of the Council (or Committee), that interest must be disclosed as soon as practicable after the start of the meeting and the reasons given for declaring such interest.

As members are aware, the provisions of the Local Government Act restrict any member who has declared a pecuniary interest in any matter from participating in the discussion or voting on that matter, and requires that member to vacate the Chamber.

Council's Code of Conduct provides that if members have a non-pecuniary conflict of interest, the nature of the conflict must be disclosed. The Code of Conduct also provides for a number of ways in which a member may manage non pecuniary conflicts of interest.

#### SUPPORTING INFORMATION

Directors Comment: Item 3.2 Presentation by Dean Brus (That Council review fees/charges for the hangar leases with the proposal by Dean Brus of \$1.00 per sq/m for land outside hanger). It should be noted that Council's Fees and Charges were set following a commercial review of other airport lease rates in 2015 and adjusted in line with annual changes to Fees and Charges since.

The land outside the hangar does have a benefit to each leaseholder, as its presence negates the need to have firewalls constructed as part of their hangar construction. Thereby saving on the cost of constructing hangars.

If Council is of an opinion that it wants to entertain Mr Brus and the Airport Community Committee recommendation, then I would recommend that a commercial review is well overdue and should form part of the resolution, prior to agreeing to the rate and advertising for 28 days.

Also noting that any change will also be implemented progressively as leases expire. As a number of leaseholders have already signed leases agreeing to the current fees and charges, adopted in June 2025 together with the budget.

#### Jim Hazelton

Born in Cudal on June 21st, 1931, James David (Jim) Hazelton was a country boy from Toogong. He grew up on the family farm "Willow" and was one of seven children in the family. Being the youngest, he was given the pet name of "Chick" by his elder sister, Ruth. Throughout his childhood he was known by that name although he became "Jim" to all as a young adult.

Due to an adventurous spirit manifesting as a mischievous demeanour, Jim was sent to be educated at the Walaroi Methodist Boarding School for boys in Orange after he clashed with a new teacher at the small local school at Toogong. It was during this period that Jim's interest in Aviation grew. Inspired by an increasing frequency of military aircraft over local skies, his brother Bruce's enlistment in the RAAF, and an impromptu and unauthorised display over town by the RAAF trainers from Temora, Jim became mesmerised by all things aviation.

During his final year attending Walaroi College, Jim, at the age of just 15 years, began his initial flying training with the Orange Aero Club (then a branch of the Newcastle Aero Club) at the old Bloomfield Aerodrome. He had been taken for a joy flight in a CAC Wackett trainer by Orange local, Greg Barrett, and became completely infatuated with the idea of flying. During his training, Jim also worked for the club keeping the books, refuelling aircraft, and maintaining flight records.

Contrary to his days at school, Jim was the model student pilot and progressed well throughout his training. He trained predominantly in De Havilland DH-82 Tiger Moth aircraft although also spent time in Auster J5 and Avro 643 Cadet aircraft. At the conclusion of his training he was sent by his Chief Flight Instructor, George Campbell, to

Bankstown Airport where he would undertake both his commercial flight test as well as the test for his Instructor Rating. His flight examiner at Bankstown was Reginald Ansett (Later, Sir Reginald Ansett).

Upon gaining his Commercial License and Instructor Rating, Jim was employed as an instructor at the Bloomfield Aerodrome with the Newcastle Aero Club. He made a name for himself as good instructor who was strict with standards but affable in character. Interestingly, among his many students were three of his own brothers, Bruce, Max, and Kerry.

Jim instructed with the Newcastle Aero Club for approximately two years before embarking on a new business venture, an air charter service between Mackay, QLD, and Lindeman Island. This business venture was short-lived as Jim returned home suddenly to join the search for his brother, Max, who had crashed his Auster Aircraft in the Blue Mountains on a flight between Bankstown and Toogong. Max eventually walked out of the bush six days later after a gruelling ordeal in mountainous terrain.

Jim then decided to remain in his home area and joined Max in the air taxi business that had recently been launched. This involved newspaper runs and charter flights in their Auster aircraft. However, during their search for a replacement for the Auster that Max had crashed in the Blue Mountains, the two brothers discovered the new model Cessna aircraft, the Cessna C180.

The Cessna C180 was a revolutionary aircraft at that time and opened far greater opportunities than the older aircraft models allowed. It was soon decided that the two

brothers would delve into the then fledgling industry of aerial agriculture. With Australia's wool industry booming and the overwhelming demand for the spreading of superphosphate fertiliser throughout the pastoral areas, it was decided to offer their services in this field.

This new venture proved to be insatiably demanding. The Hazelton brothers increased their flying exponentially, principally on spreading operations while also still offering their original air taxi service. Such services also included special humanitarian relief efforts

such as the dropping of fodder to stranded livestock during floods.

It was soon decided that a line be drawn north to south through the city of Orange and Max would service everything west of that line while Jim looked after everything to the east. This model eventually saw the mutually amicable separation into two separate

businesses and saw the birth of Hazair Agricultural Service Pty Ltd. Jim registered that business name on the 18th of December 1956.

Jim's new business was primarily involved in the service of spreading superphosphate fertiliser for graziers across a very broad swathe of New South Wales although Jim still conducted occasional charter services, paper runs, and continued instructing at the Bloomfield Aerodrome. At this early stage the business was based from Jim's elder brother John's airstrip on "Pretty Plains" near Milthorpe.

The business grew exponentially, fuelled by the booming wool industry and its demand for fertiliser. Jim continued to develop and refine operations, introducing new equipment and practices in all aspects from bulk fertiliser handling to spreading techniques. Still, the business grew.

Jim was a founding member of the Aerial Agricultural Association of Australia (1958) and went on to serve as President of that association. He is recognised by the Aerial Agricultural industry as having trained countless agricultural pilots and mentored them through their quite challenging careers. Recent CEO of the now Aerial Application Association of Australia has extended his own support for the importance of a memorial to lim.

In 1961 the business had outgrown the small facility at "Pretty Plains" and, with the opening of the new Orange Airport, Jim built the first facility at the airport consisting of a new hangar and office building which still stand to the west of the airport terminal building today. The new facility allowed Jim to broaden the operations of the business with the incorporation of aircraft sales and Maintenance added under the separate business name of Hazair Sales and Service Pty Ltd.

At the same time Jim's fleet of aircraft also grew to incorporate more Cessna C180's, Piper Pawnee, and Cropmaster types. A southern base was also opened at the Albury Airport with the purchase of an existing company, Air Spraying and Spreading Pty Ltd, based there. The Albury base was renamed Hazair (Albury) Pty Ltd. An employee, Kieth Death, whom Jim had taught to fly, moved to Albury with his wife to run that base and later purchased it from Jim.

As the business quickly grew, Jim began to travel and, upon a business trip to the USA in the early 1960's, he noticed the lack of regulatory burden on American aviation business operators. As a result he became determined to campaign to level the aviation playing field in Australia.

Jim eventually branched out away from the Orange area and the Central West. He purchased a controlling share in Navair Pty Ltd, significant flying school based at Bankstown. At this time Jim was also becoming involved in ferrying light aircraft to Australia from the United States. He was the first Australian to ferry across the Pacific Ocean in a single engine aircraft, a Piper Comanche 400. This was also the very first 400 Comanche delivered to Australia and was one that Jim had sold through Hazair Sales and Service Pty Ltd.

Jim became very interested in the aircraft ferry operations and, increasingly, took on more and more international ferry contracts for both his own aircraft sales business and for external clients. This eventually became the entirety of Jim's career and saw him fly in excess of 200 trans-Pacific flights between the USA and Australia as well as countless other international destinations.

Jim's involvement with Navair Pty Ltd allowed him to travel a great deal more which was definitely in accordance with his adventurous nature. He was also able to nurture many hundreds of student pilots through their training, many of whom have gone on to play quite senior roles in aviation worldwide.

He has trained many celebrities such as famous racing car drivers, Sir Jackie Stewart, Graham Hill, and Jim Clark. All three spoke very highly of Jim both as a friend and a mentor. Sir Jackie Stewart has made his own contribution towards the importance of a memorial to Jim.

Throughout his career Jim was able to befriend a wide range of people and his adventurous spirit saw him involved in many pioneering and innovative expeditions. He accompanied entrepreneur Dick Smith on a helicopter treck to the North Pole. Mr Smith also speaks very highly of Jim and has also written his own submission in support of a memorial to Jim.

Jim's campaigning against over regulation of aviation in Australia often saw him draw the attention of the DCA, CAA, and CASA (all evolving versions of the current Civil Aviation Safety Authority) and sometimes for damning reasons. However, due to his campaigns we can thank Jim for such modern privileges as the Night Visual Flight Rules (NVFR) Rating. Very few individuals can take credit for such achievements with our aviation regulator.

Jim Hazelton's life was recorded, shortly before his death in 2014, by Author Mark Nelson. That record now comprises the book "Jim Hazelton, Born to Fly" which was published in 2020. Mark's book contains many, many accounts of Jim's adventures and is a must-read.

Further to our recent discussion, AAAA is delighted to provide a letter of support for the renaming of Orange airport in recognition of Jim Hazleton's contribution to aviation in Australia, and especially to his role in the development of aerial agriculture and his important role in advancing aviation in the central west.

Many of our industry members were mentored by Jim in the 1960s and 70s. He was clearly a great pilot, instructor and mentor who helped pave the way for the aerial agricultural industry. He was particularly valuable in his role of helping to educate the then regulator – the Department of Civil Aviation – when they first sought to regulate the industry in the early 1960s.

Some of the Directors of AAAA knew Jim very well and have indicated the respect he had around the world – including teaching current pilots the trade of international aircraft ferries across the Pacific. Jim was an extremely generous man - he would do anything to help anyone at any time. He certainly was a man that "paid forward" in kindness long before that was an ideal.

Jim and his brother Max founded Hazelton Air Taxi and Charter Service at Orange in 1953, with Max working the southern section of the business and Jim the northern. Jim then went on to found Hazair (Orange) in 1956. They were both innovators and early adaptors, importing new specialised aerial agricultural aircraft from the US. Jim eventually sold the Hazair (Orange) aerial agricultural business to the reconstituted Hazelton Air Services in 1969. These details are drawn from Derrick Rolland's excellent history of Aerial Agriculture in Australia.

Jim trained many aerial application pilots and played an active role as a member of the AAAA – being one of the founding members of the Association at its inaugural meeting in 1958.

Jim was also a great ambassador for the wider general aviation community. AAAA believes that remembering and honouring our aviation pioneers is very important for the future aviation generations that will otherwise forget great mentors and industry builders like Jim.

AAAA strongly supports your efforts to have the Orange Airport named after Jim Hazleton in recognition of his contribution to the Orange community and also to aerial agriculture and aviation in Australia.

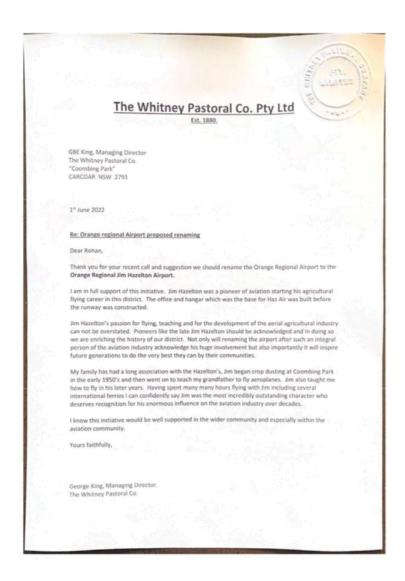

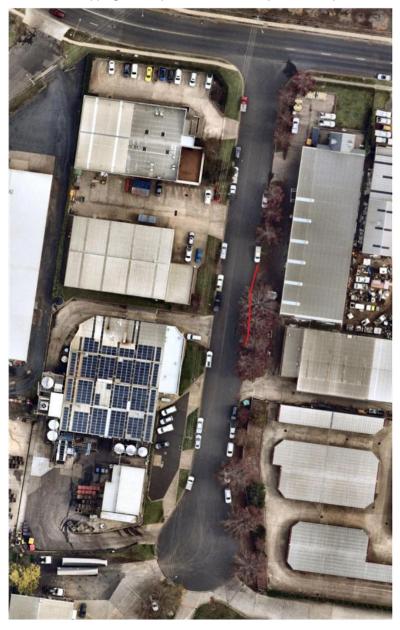

Specific concerns raised and addressed included:

- · Inadequate formal parking for the school either on the roadside or within the school grounds
  - This is acknowledged and it is recommended that Council write to the Department of Education to address the issue.
- The legality of parking in a school zone.
  - It is legal to park within a school zone in NSW in accordance with any signposted restrictions. From the photos provided by the complainant and observations by Council officers, the majority of vehicles parked on the roadside are on the road shoulder and is legal. Parking on a verge in a school zone is however, prohibited. In a rural area (without Kerb and Gutter) a verge would technically be described as the area between the invert of the table drain and the property line.
- · Sight distance issues for vehicles exiting driveways
  - Speeds in this section of Forest Road are a maximum of 80km/h and 40km/h during school zone hours. Infrequent parking outside of school zone hours. Events only.
  - Property owners have the ability to exit the property in a forward direction.

Re-Safety and road signage at Spring Terrace (School zone)

Key points

- 1. Major road upgrade done in 2021/22, council map attached.
- 2. The upgrade included works on the schools car park area, resulting in less car parks overall, now only 8-9 spaces and a bus zone. This is inadequate given the number of students is growing. Cars are actually double parking which itself is a dangerous situation.
- 3. Since these upgrades people are parking anywhere they see fit, this is resulting in dangerous manoeuvres, lack of visibility for residents leaving their properties and a severe bottleneck next to the car parks steel barrier particularly when cars park on the verge (see photos).
- 4. Given the rules governing school zones are quite specific we are asking for help to have the correct signage installed to reflect the rules and simply make it clear where people need to park etc. I've engaged the school [
- 5.The signage may be the Dept of Roads reasonability, I'm not sure, however if this is the case perhaps Council could assist in expediting this request. I believe 6-8 no stopping signs and a dozen white road markers would go a long way in helping make it safer for everyone.

6.Another problem we also have miners stopping in the school zone at very early hours (4-5am) on their way to work, this is annoying when they drive V8 utes and leave them idling or take off revving their engines. Signage would also help with this.

I've attached several photos and maps, id also be happy to discuss this further with the Traffic committee if needed to improve the safety of this area .

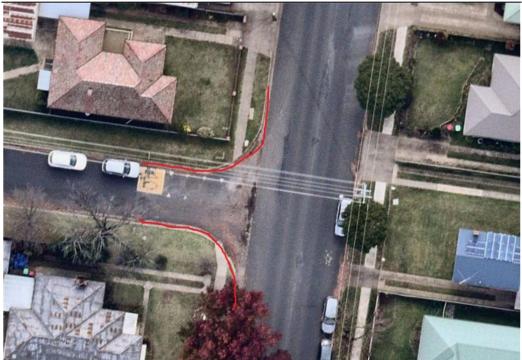

## 4.1 Security of Critical Infrastructure Act

#### SUPPORTING INFORMATION

#### **Background**

The <u>Security of Critical Infrastructure Act 2018</u> (the SOCI Act) outlines the legal obligations you have if you own, operate, or have direct interests in critical infrastructure assets. The SOCI Act also outlines how the government can support you if an incident occurs that impacts your critical infrastructure asset.

The SOCI Act applies to the following 11 sectors:

- Communications
- · Financial services and markets
- · Data storage or processing
- Defence industry
- Higher education and research
- Energy
- Food and grocery
- · Healthcare and medical
- Space technology
- Transport
- · Water and sewerage

While Council manages its own data storage, water, sewerage and transport assets, none of which are yet identified as Systems of National Significance to which the SOCI Act applies. For example, for a water and sewerage system to be a System of National Significance, there needs to be more than 100,000 connections. Orange City Council manages approximately 18,000 connections.

## Protected information:

The SOCI Act protects information about critical infrastructure assets. This means that it is an offence to disclose information about these assets, even if you are a responsible entity, unless your disclosure complies with the SOCI Act. For information about who is allowed to disclose protected information and when they can do so, go to protected information.

Therefore, while we respect the good intentions of Mr Alford in bringing this matter forward, it is inappropriate for Council to consider potential Critical Infrastructure Assets of other authorities in a Community Committee.

### **Storage of Cars**

The parking of cars is a permitted activity within Transgrid's easements as identified in 3.6 of their Easement Guidelines (June 2024) available by following the link below:

### Transgrid living and working with easements guidelines 2024

Further, Council has no part to play in the control of these activities that would be considered exempt activities. If Transgrid did have issue with the storage of cars under the transmission lines, they would need to take this matter up with the landholder and/or lease holder directly.

### **Past Grass Fires**

Past grass fires on the inside bend of the East Orange Channel have fortunately been extinguished relatively quickly by emergency services before spreading. Vegetation on the natural earth batter of the channel is encouraged to stabilise the batters and avoid erosion. Looking through the guidelines there are many other permitted or conditional activities that could involve a fire including trees up to 4m above ground level. On this basis and the fact that Transgrid have not requested any vegetation trimming, I suspect the grass fire was not a concern for Transgrid.

#### Tree

On inspection, the tree is growing within the batter of the East Orange Channel on the edge of the 66KV HV transmission line easement of 10m. It is nowhere near the 4m above footpath level/ground level that would see Transgrid have concern for the tree.

The channel narrows downstream from this location, so from an overall hydraulic efficiency of the channel, the tree has little to no effect.

It is a healthy tree in full bud presently and removal of the same would compromise the integrity of the batter and the adjacent fence and driveway on top of batter. As such, from an operational perspective, there is no need to remove or trim this tree at this point in time.

When the order was finalised, 5,079 LED fittings were to be installed, of which 156 were catenary lighting and 70 others had issues that required further investigation.

As well as energy savings, the LED lighting also improves pedestrian safety as shown in the following trial image.



The following images show a 'before and after' of a trial site in Bathurst:

There were some initial delays with agreement of and supply of LED fittings and at or about this time, Essential Energy also changed their policy on supporting catenary lighting. Therefore, 226 required individual assessment and design involving anything from full pole replacement to special purpose outstands off existing poles, which was commenced following the initial roll out of replacement fittings.

By way of update, Essential Energy started with 132 suspension/catenary lights to replace in July last year (2024) and have reduced this number to 88. Essential Energy are working through a proactive replacement program which will take some time and have committed to providing a timeframe for this shortly. We hope to have this update prior to the 16 September Major Projects and Infrastructure Community Committee meeting.

So, in July 2024 Essential Energy were 97.4% complete, and in September 2025 they are 98.3% complete. While we acknowledge there are still some sections to complete, Council and Essential Energy have worked collaboratively to improve the street lighting in Orange. This is particularly through Essential Energy's Public Lighting and Unmetered Supplies Manager and Council's Manager Engineering Services.

 Works are completed on the Lake Canobolas Sewer Pumpstation with commissioning of the pumpstation completed on 28 August 2025. Council will progressively change the internal sewer service to the new pumpstation.

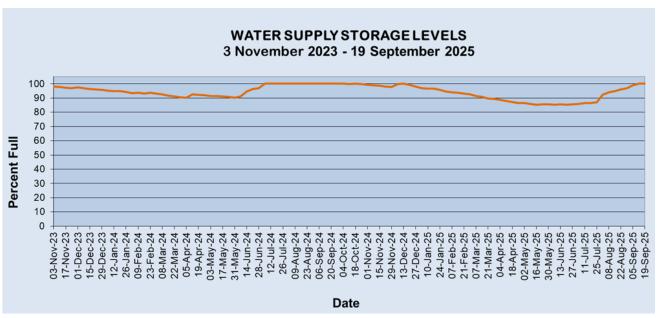

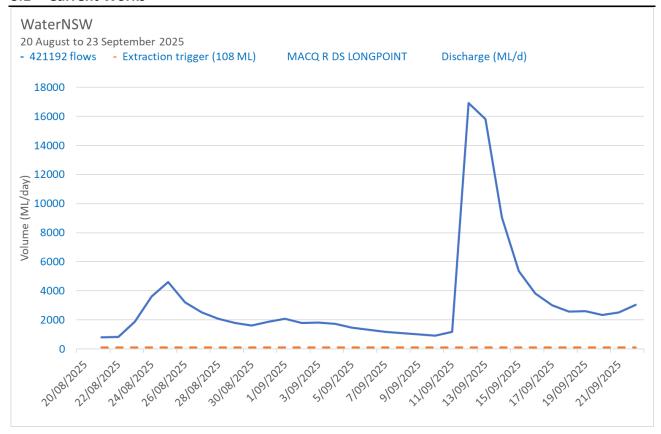
The Decision Support Tool (DST) Water Year Analysis was conducted 28 July 2025 predicting neutral conditions for the year ahead from the Bureau of Meteorology's POAMA forecast. No additional external supplies are predicted to be required. A quarterly Decision Support Tool review shall be conducted in October.

### **Macquarie River Flows**

The mean daily flows in the Macquarie River monitored downstream of Long Point (Station 421192) for 20 August to 23 September 2025 are presented below. The data was sourced from the WaterNSW website with flows presented in megalitres per day (ML/d).

The lowest mean daily flow rate was recorded on 20 August 2025 at approx. 808 ML/d which then increased to a maximum of 16,912 ML/d on 11 September 2025. The flow rates were above the extraction trigger value (108 ML/d) for the period.





## **Demand Management**

Residential water use

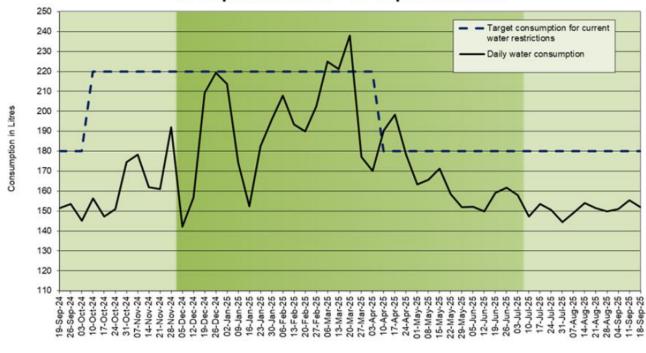
Permanent Water Saving Standards came into effect on Friday 25 June 2021.

## **DRINKING WATER QUALITY**

Water samples are collected as a component of Orange City Council's Drinking Water Quality Monitoring Program in accordance with NSW Health requirements. Samples are collected regularly and sent to the NSW Government National Association of Testing Authorities (NATA) accredited laboratory for analysis.

The Icely Road supply system achieved 100% compliance for physical, chemical and microbiological samples in August 2025.



### PROJECT MANAGEMENT OFFICE

## East Orange Harvesting Wetlands (Blackman's Swamp Creek Stormwater Harvesting Stage 2)

This project, when completed, will provide an offline storage on Blackman's Swamp Creek to increase the city's water supply secure yield from stormwater harvesting.

DCCEEW has subsequently issued an approval for the works under the Water Management Act 2000 in October 2024. There was a joint appeal by two applicants with DCCEEW listed as the first respondent and Council the second respondent on 21 November 2024.

The first directions hearing was held on 20 January 2025 and set down dates for conciliation. The conciliation process was finalised over four meetings without a resolution. A second directions hearing was held on the 14 July 2025 to set a hearing date in the Land and Environment Court. The court has listed the date for hearing for 4 days (plus 1 day in reserve) commencing in Orange on 1 December 2025. The remaining days will be in Sydney.

## **Sewage Treatment Plant Inlet Works**

Progress on the project remains limited due to seasonal constraints, with minor works continuing onsite. As part of the contractor's quality assurance process, a defect was identified in the epoxy coating applied to internal components of the inlet works. This issue has delayed commissioning, and rectification is required before the system can be brought online.

The contractor is actively progressing the resolution of this issue and has engaged a specialist subcontractor to remove the existing epoxy and reapply a new coating. However, due to the temperature sensitivity of the epoxy application, major rectification works are now scheduled to recommence later in spring, when conditions are more suitable for achieving a durable and compliant finish.

In the interim, the contractor is finalising onboarding of the subcontractor and developing a detailed rectification methodology to ensure long-term performance. Preparations are also underway for a potential chamber cut over, which will be scheduled based on the progress of remaining works and operational requirements.

## **Orange Conservatorium and Planetarium**

The Orange Conservatorium and Planetarium project continues to advance gradually, with structural, services, and internal works progressing across all key areas. At the Conservatorium, Level 2 structural steel installation has continued, with columns, rafters, and purlins now in place across the eastern roof gridlines. CFC sheeting has been installed, and roofing works are scheduled to commence in the coming days. Internally, hydraulic, electrical, and mechanical services are being installed across both levels, with coordination focused on meeting design and performance standards. On Level 1, preparations are underway to begin closing in walls with acoustic-rated plasterboard, marking a key step in the internal fit-out process. A major milestone was also reached with the installation of the rooftop mechanical unit, supporting integration of building services.



External cladding works commenced earlier in the program but are now paused pending further advancement of Level 2 works. Window installation and lightweight framing are underway, with façade works to resume once structural sequencing allows. Offsite, the prefabricated dome components for the Planetarium have been completed in the United States and are currently in transit. The shipment has a scheduled arrival in Sydney on 4 November 2025. Following customs clearance, the dome is anticipated to arrive in Orange by mid-November.

In the Recital Hall, structural steel installation is underway with the catwalk install inside commencing this month as well. The internal weld plates have been completed and props supporting the wall are starting to be removed, supporting the next phase of construction in this technically complex area. The foyer steel to the southern end of the Recital Hall has been installed.

## **Orange Sports Precinct**

The turf installation component of the Orange Sports Precinct is now complete, with only minor defects remaining to be addressed. These include fencing rectification and other final tasks. The contractor is preparing to hand over the fields to the relevant asset owner, with all required documentation and maintenance plans being finalised to support a smooth transition and long-term functionality.

Works along Huntley Road have now commenced and are progressing well between periods of wet weather. The contractor is actively undertaking service relocations, including gas infrastructure, and sewer installation works are underway through the field area. A temporary carpark (Carpark 4) has also been established to support users during verge construction, ensuring continued access and minimal disruption to site operations.

The tender for JD Stadium closed this week. With both the Development Application and heritage approvals now secured — including endorsement from the Western Region Planning Panel — the project is moving into the next phase. Tender evaluation will now be undertaken, with the aim of appointing a contractor and commencing onsite prior to Christmas. Landscaping and footpath works are ongoing in and around Fields 1–8, with activity ramping up in the coming weeks to allow grass or seed to be laid during optimal growing conditions.

Significant progress has also been made on design packages for electrical infrastructure and carparks. Design for the permanent power supply is complete, and tenders are now being prepared. Design development for four carparks and the Forest Road intersection is also well advanced, supporting broader precinct access and long-term functionality.

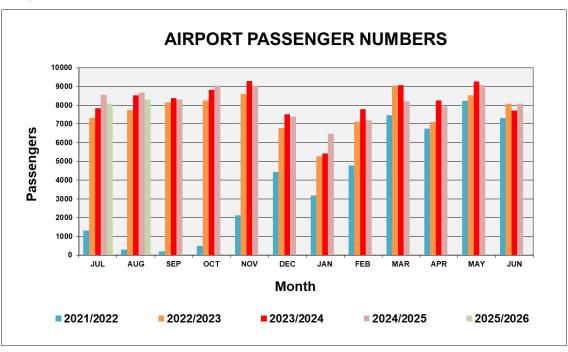
## Saleyards

These figures include passenger numbers from Regional Express, Link Airways (formerly Fly Corporate) and QantasLink.



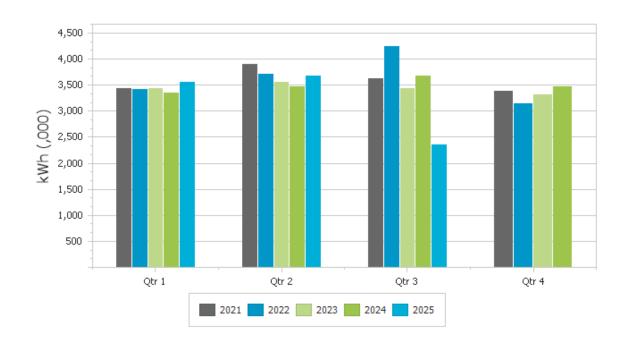

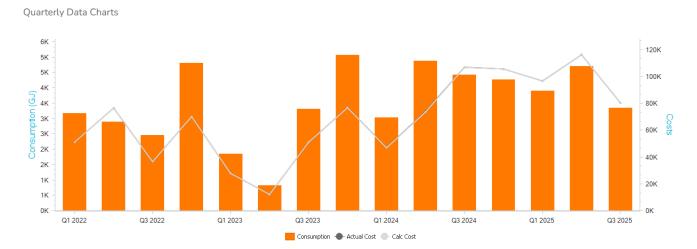
