### 1.2 Declaration of pecuniary interests, significant non-pecuniary interests and less than significant non-pecuniary interests

The provisions of Chapter 14 of the Local Government Act, 1993 (the Act) regulate the way in which Councillors and designated staff of Council conduct themselves to ensure that there is no conflict between their private interests and their public role.

The Act prescribes that where a member of Council (or a Committee of Council) has a direct or indirect financial (pecuniary) interest in a matter to be considered at a meeting of the Council (or Committee), that interest must be disclosed as soon as practicable after the start of the meeting and the reasons given for declaring such interest.

As members are aware, the provisions of the Local Government Act restrict any member who has declared a pecuniary interest in any matter from participating in the discussion or voting on that matter, and requires that member to vacate the Chamber.

Council's Code of Conduct provides that if members have a non-pecuniary conflict of interest, the nature of the conflict must be disclosed. The Code of Conduct also provides for a number of ways in which a member may manage non pecuniary conflicts of interest.

More importantly, with a number of large residential subdivisions underway or planned, the selection of appropriate names should be guided by a policy informed by community input.

#### STAFF COMMENT

Guidance on place naming in New South Wales (NSW) is provided by the Geographical Names Board and any proposal to develop a policy by Council is required to comply with the NSW Place Naming Policy.

#### Extract:

"The Geographical Names Act 1966 recognises the importance of unambiguous and official place names. Place names reflect the relationship between people and place and create a link that forms the basis for communication, location and addressing. Clear and unambiguous place names are essential for emergency services, postal and service delivery as well as professional and personal navigation.

The GNB is committed to recognising our Aboriginal cultural heritage by registering place names given by Aboriginal people so that they can be assigned as geographical names alone or used alongside existing non-Aboriginal names."

### Naming of Parks and Park Facilities Policy



#### Scope

The policy addresses the convention and process for the naming of parks, artworks, park buildings and clubhouses, and geographical features in Council owned and managed open space parks and reserves.

All place and infrastructure asset naming proposals will be assessed in accordance with this policy, undergo public exhibition and comment and/or be resolved by Council prior to their registration and/or assignation.

In observing this policy, Council aims at all time to act in a manner consistent with the applicable naming rules. In selecting appropriate names, Council will endeavour to create a "sense of place" and to honour and observe the local character and history of the relevant geographic area, place or infrastructure asset.

#### 2. Purpose

To formalise the principles and processes by which the City of Ryde names community infrastructure assets and public places, ensuring that a consistent, fair and equitable protocol is followed.

This policy will provide the standards and conditions for the naming of parks, facilities and infrastructure within the City of Ryde. This document provides the policy direction for standardised and unambiguous naming conventions for the City of Ryde and will reflect the relevant legislation and policy guidelines.

#### 3. Principles / Responsibilities

Community infrastructure assets and public places are reminders of local history, culture and citizens, and are named appropriately to match the context and significance of the asset. Names are an important navigation and reference tool in our community. They tell us where we are, define places, and are part of our community's identity

#### **GUIDING PRINCIPLES**

In general terms, naming should be unique and use form, spelling and style of contemporary Australian English. In particular cases, naming practice should take into account contemporary Indigenous and Torres Strait Islander spoken languages. Names should ensure clear community identification of what name applies to which place or feature, and to enable clear communication in times of emergency.

A name shall be wherever possible:

- relevant to Australian, preferably local, history, flora, fauna, culture, local landscape and physical characteristics;
- short and simple preferably not more than three words;

### Naming of Parks and Park Facilities Policy



- names must be easy to pronounce, spell and write. An exception to this is in the
  use of Aboriginal words when it is accepted that a name may at first appear to be
  complex but will, over time, become more familiar and accepted by the community
- in all respects, in accordance with community standards;
- complementary with and sensitive to existing names and design themes of adjoining assets;
- not easily confused with or duplicating names within the region or nearby local governments;
- be considerate of any potential risk to the reputation of the City and/or Council from aligning with an individual or company whose reputation may vary.
- have strong local community support.

If personal names are used, the person commemorated should:

- have contributed significantly to the development, protection or enhancement of the City of Ryde that has produced long-term improvements in the area or community;
- · have actively served or contributed to an area of national or international importance;
- have a long-term association with a local community group or service club (twenty years or more),
- service to the community or organisation and/or must have donated property or funds for community benefit;
- · have their birth name recognised no nick names;
- · preferably be recognised in memoriam.

Note: names that commemorate a living person will not be considered for parks and reserves, community infrastructure and/or public places.

Names of living persons are by their nature subject to partisan perception and change in community judgement and acceptance. For this reason the adoption of a personal name during the lifetime of the person concerned should only be made in exceptional circumstance.

Sensitivity to diverse cultural situations should be applied when selecting names and derogatory or discriminatory terms or terms likely to cause offence will not be approved.

Note: Applications for the use of personal names being nominated for Infrastructure Assets must be substantiated by a minimum of three (3) persons outlining the person's association with and main contribution(s) to local community.

Names of commercial entities must not be used unless part of a formal sponsorship proposal. This is considered under the City's Sponsorship Policy.

#### NAMING OF PARKS AND RESERVES

The City is responsible for the naming of parks and open spaces which it owns or manages. While there is no legislative requirement to officially name parks, it assists the community with addressing and provides a sense of place. The naming of parks, reserves and

components of reserves will therefore meet the requirements under the NSW Government Geographical Names Board - Guidelines for the Determination of Place Names.

The Geographical Names Board maintains a Geographical Names Register and the City, once the name is approved through this policy, will submit all names of parks, reserves and open spaces to the Geographical Names Board to be officially assigned and recognised.

### NAMING OF COMMUNITY ASSETS, BUILDINGS AND OTHER INFRASTRUCTURE WITHIN PARKS

The City is responsible for the naming of parks and open spaces which it owns or manages. The naming of buildings and other infrastructure within parks and open spaces is not covered by legislation. The City may therefore, through a resolution of Council, name its assets as it sees fit. Names can assist with identity and clarity of purpose.

There is no requirement or guidelines under the Geographical Names Board for the naming of buildings or other objects/spaces not defined as a road, park or a place; however for consistency and transparency, the City will apply the same Guiding Principles outlined previously in this policy for all spaces, places and objects within a park that require a name.

#### RENAMING OF COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE OR PUBLIC PLACES

Renaming will only occur in an extraordinary case. Evidence of substantial community support must be provided for a change in name.

Where infrastructure or a public place has been named after a person and that person comes into disrepute through illegal activities, conviction or similar, whether retrospectively or subsequent to the naming, the name of the infrastructure or place shall be immediately removed.

Where a name change is being considered for any of the City's infrastructure (or reserve), the request is to be firstly referred to Geographical Names Board (GNB) to confirm if the current name is officially approved by the GNB. If the current name is not officially approved by GNB, the City can apply for the new name to be approved through GNB. For the naming of any infrastructure after the street in which it is located, only the name of the street should be used and should not include the suffix (e.g. Thomson Pavilion - not Thomson Street Pavilion).

If the current name is officially approved by GNB, Council will need to approve a recommendation to GNB for the change of name. Once the new name is approved by GNB, the City can use this policy and procedure to officially change the name of the infrastructure asset.

Any naming, or renaming recommended to GNB should be accompanied with a plan to identify what is being named. The naming could include only the infrastructure on a park or reserve, only the reserve, or both the infrastructure and the park or reserve.

#### REQUIREMENTS FOR NAMING PROPOSALS

#### POLICY REQUIREMENTS

Implementation of this policy rests with the responsible department accountable for the asset to be named or renamed.

The operational actions required to progress a naming proposal, and internal and external consultation required, is outlined in the Naming Proposal Procedure below.

Naming of Parks and Reserves or Facilities within Parks Procedure

All naming proposals must be:

- checked for conformance with this policy and the policies and principles of the NSW Addressing User Manual,
- · checked for conformance with GNB Guidelines for the determination of placenames

Once the proposed name has been checked for conformity with the abovementioned policies and principles, a report will be presented to Council who will approve the name in principle and to proceed to public exhibition.

The proposed name will be placed on public exhibition and consultation undertaken in accordance with the City's Community Engagement Strategy. Notice will be given to the relevant Authorities, local residents and businesses (as appropriate) for a period of 28 days with a further 14 days allowed for the receipt of written public submissions.

The submissions will then be reviewed and if any feedback is received during the public exhibition period, a report prepared for Council. If no feedback is received during the public exhibition period, the proposed name will be taken as adopted by Council.

The name will then be submitted to the Geographical Names Board for approval or registration on the Geographical Names Register, and finally Gazettal in the NSW Government Gazette.

#### SIGNAGE

Any signage used to identify the name of Infrastructure Assets must be in line with the City's signage practices, design standards, and guidelines. The use of the City's logo will be in accordance with the City's image protocols.

#### Attachment 1:

#### **DEFINITIONS**

**Community Infrastructure** – any property, complex, structure, building, bridge, asset, sporting field owned or under the control of the City, excluding public roads.

**Community Place** - an area owned or under the control of the City that is not deemed to be a park (Eg plaza).

Geographical Names Board (GNB) – A NSW Government entity which is empowered by the Geographical Names Act 1966. This provides the Board with the power to assign names to places to:

- investigate and determine the form, spelling, meaning, pronunciation, origin and history of any geographical name and
- determine the application of each name with regard to position, extent or other reference

#### 1. TITLE

This Policy is to be known as Naming of Roads and Places Policy

#### 2. PURPOSE

Names provide an important link between the community and the country or places in which the names appear. Names can also reflect the history of our communities. This Policy supports recognition of First Nations peoples, cultures and histories in the naming of places in the public domain.

First Nations names are to be chosen in consultation or validated with the First Nations Groups/Organisations in the local area, who have a relationship to the site.

Notable, pioneers and European history names are to be chosen in consultation or validated with Council's Local Studies Librarian or Council's Heritage Advisor.

War veteran names will be chosen in consultation or validated with the family of the veterans then with Council's Local Studies Librarian and the Richmond and Windsor RSL Sub-Branches.

All names will be considered by First Nations Groups/Organisations in the local area, who may make recommendations for report back to Council.

This Policy provides guidance for the naming of suburbs, roads, parks and reserves, buildings, bridges and features that are owned, operated, managed or under the authority of Council, with the exception being private roads.

This Policy does not replace the Guidelines and Policies created by the Geographical Names Board of New South Wales. All naming proposals must be checked for conformance with the Geographical Names Board of New South Wales Guidelines for the determination of place names.

This Policy does not include commercial arrangements where naming is given in conjunction with sponsorship rights.

#### 3. SCOPE

The Policy applies to all parks, open spaces, roads and buildings owned, operated or managed by Hawkesbury City Council.

This Policy also applies to places, including suburbs and localities, but does not supersede any requirements of the Geographical Names Board of New South Wales, who are the naming authority for places in the state of New South Wales.

This Policy will also be used in the consideration of any names suggested by the general public or requests from the community for endorsement of a name that they intend to submit to the Geographical Names Board.

This Policy does not apply retrospectively.

#### 4. BACKGROUND

This Policy is made in accordance with Resolution 187 of Item 144 of the Ordinary Council Meeting held on 13 June 2018, in which Council resolved:

"That

2. Council develop a Naming Policy for its Roads, Buildings, Parks and Reserves."

#### 5. NAMING PROPOSAL CATEGORIES

#### 5.1 Reporting Requirements

All naming proposals are reported to a meeting of Council to seek resolution to commence public consultation. Leading to the subsequent endorsement or rejection of a naming proposal. This excludes private roads which do not require public consultation.

#### 5.2 Naming Principles

All naming proposals should be named in accordance with one of the following, depending on the feature that is to be named

- NSW Geographical Names Act 1966
- NSW Address Policy and User Manual
- NSW Geographical Names Board Place Naming Policy
- NSW Heritage Council Policy Place Names of Heritage Value

Council endorses the use of names relevant to the Hawkesbury area. The themes are as follows:-

- First Nations history and language
- Notable pioneers and pioneer families who lived in the Hawkesbury area
- · Flora and Fauna (English or First Nations language)
- Landscape/Amenity
- War veterans
- · Significant local identities
- Cultural diversity
- European history

Names provide an important link between the community and the country or places in which the names appear. Names can also reflect the history of our communities. This Policy supports recognition of First Nations People in the naming of places in the public domain.

First Nations names are to be chosen in consultation or validated with the First Nations Groups/Organisations in the local area, who have a relationship to the site.

Notable, pioneers and European history names are to be chosen in consultation or validated with Council's Local Studies Librarian or Council's Heritage Advisor.

War veteran names will be chosen in consultation or validated with the family of the veterans then with Council's Local Studies Librarian and the Richmond and Windsor RSL Sub-Branches.

All other name types will be chosen in consultation or validated with any other group that may be deemed necessary. All names will be considered by First Nations Groups/Organisations in the local area, who may make recommendations for report back to Council.

Council requires the consent of the immediate family for names commemorating a deceased person unless the name is of a historical person that lived in the distant past.

#### 5.3 Naming Proposal Categories

#### 5.3.1 Suburb Naming

When naming is required

Council's suburb boundaries were officially defined in September 2004. As they have been defined, naming may need to be reviewed from time to time due to addressing issues or urban development.

Names may come from the Geographical Names Board of New South Wales, Council or members of the public.

#### Responsibilities

- The Geographical Names Board of New South Wales has the statutory responsibility under the Geographical Names Act 1966 to assign names and determine definitive boundaries for suburbs and localities throughout NSW.
- Suburb and locality names require have the endorsement of Council. Council plays an important role in consulting with residents, businesses and other interested stakeholders.

#### 5.3.2 Road Naming (Public and Private)

When naming is required

- Development of a new public road/s in a subdivision.
- Development of new private road/s in a subdivision.
- · Unformed road that is to be formed
- · Unnamed roads that are to be used for addressing purposes.

For public road/s the name proposed may come from the developer of the subdivision, Council staff or members of the community.

For private road/s the name proposal is to come from the developer, unless the developer requests Council to source a name.

#### Responsibilities

- The Geographical Names Board of New South Wales has a role in the road naming process to set policy and processes for all road naming proposals in NSW. They also compile, maintain and publish a list of road names as per the NSW Geographical Names Act 1966.
- The NSW Address Policy and User Manual applies to all roads in NSW, regardless of custodianship and maintenance agreements.
- Council is the Road Naming Authority under the Roads Act 1993 and Roads Regulation 2018 for all local and regional roads.
- Under the NSW Address Policy and User Manual, Council is responsible for all State Roads, Crown Roads, Private Roads, Right of Ways/easements for addressing purposes.
- All roads are to be named in accordance with the NSW Address Policy and User Manual. This
  includes a notice in the NSW Government Gazette.
- All road name proposals are submitted via NSW Place and Road Naming Proposal System as part
  of the approval process with the Geographical Names Board of New South Wales.
- All name proposals are to provide background information for the proposed name/s.
- All new public/private roads in a subdivision are subject to Council's Fees and Charges.

#### 5.3.3 Parks and Reserves

When naming is required

- A new public park or reserve
- · Unnamed parks or reserves needing to be uniquely identified.
- Significant community interest in assigning or changing an existing name.
- · Change in ownership of an existing unnamed park or reserve.

Names may come from Council Staff, Council or members of the community

- The Geographical Names Board of New South Wales has a role in the parks and reserves naming
  process to set policy and processes for all proposals in NSW. They also compile, maintain and

- · The naming of parks and reserves is not covered by legislation.
- Council will name parks and reserves which it owns or manages in accordance with the Geographical Names Board of New South Wales Place Naming Policy and this Policy. This includes a notice in the NSW Government Gazette.
- Should be noted that changing an existing name can cause significant confusion to the community.
- All name proposals are to provide background information for the proposed name/s.

#### 5.3.4 Buildings

When naming is required

- Development of a new Council owned building, if it assists in uniquely identifying the building.
- Re opening of an existing Council owned building, if it assists in uniquely identifying the building.
- Change in ownership of a building to Council, if it assists in uniquely identifying the building.
- Significant community interest in assigning or changing an existing name.

#### Responsibilities

- · Naming is not covered by legislation.
- Council will name buildings which it owns or manages in accordance with the Geographical Names Board of New South Wales Place Naming Policy and this Policy.
- Should be noted that changing an existing name can cause significant confusion to the community
- All name proposals are to provide background information for the proposed name/s

#### 5.3.5 Bridges

When naming is required

Council does not generally name bridges, unless there is significant community interest in assigning a name to a bridge.

Names may come from Council Staff, Council or members of the community.

#### Responsibilities

- · Naming is not covered by legislation.
- Council will name bridges which it owns in accordance with the Geographical Names Board of New South Wales Place Naming Policy and this Policy.
- All name proposals are to provide background information for the proposed name/s.

#### 5.3.6 Other Naming

When naming is required

Other naming proposals may include:

- · Gardens, buildings or features within an open space, parks or reserve,
- · Car parks,
- Open space (not deemed a park or reserve),
- Ovals, and
- Art installations.

#### 6. FIRST NATIONS PEOPLE CULTURAL RECOGNITION

Hawkesbury City Council is committed to recognising First Nations cultural heritage and history.

An emerging consideration is the opportunity to incorporate names which contribute to achieving the outcomes of Council's Reconciliation Action Plan, which is being drafted at the time of preparing this Policy.

Local First Nations groups will be consulted on proposed names using proactive engagement.

#### 7. PUBLIC CONSULTATION

I am writing to you on behalf of ECCO to provide information about our proposal for the creation of a wetland enhancement project at the Northern end of William Maker Drive In the natural waterway which includes the confluence of two streams that flow through the area. This area has the potential to be developed into a natural wetland which still has the capacity to control stormwater surges and runoff. There is a huge potential for the existing wetlands area to be a valuable resource that will benefit both the community and the environment. This is an important opportunity for the enhancement of water quality and the natural biodiversity of the area.

The site currently consists of native and exotic vegetation with some areas of kangaroo grass on the western side.

The current engineering plans that were designed in 2014 show single large detention basins on either side of William Maker Drive. We propose an amendment to the design to allow for a series of smaller ponds at both sites of William Maker Drive that will slow the water down and be retained on site for longer.

#### Benefits of a nature-based solution:

- · Enhanced habitat and biodiversity value
- Water retained onsite for longer periods-contributing to both aquatic habitat and cooling
  effects (Council's tree canopy coverage map and corresponding heat map indicated that
  North Orange has sparse tree canopy and high temperatures.)
- · Slow the flow of water to reduce sediment and erosion.
- Aesthetic value and amenity for residents and visitors-passive re recreation, bird watching, walking etc.
- Encouraging community engagement and ownership of the area with community planting days, meetings and onsite interpretation.
- · Maintain natural streamflow.

The provisions of Chapter 14 of the Local Government Act, 1993 (the Act) regulate the way in which Councillors and designated staff of Council conduct themselves to ensure that there is no conflict between their private interests and their public role.

The Act prescribes that where a member of Council (or a Committee of Council) has a direct or indirect financial (pecuniary) interest in a matter to be considered at a meeting of the Council (or Committee), that interest must be disclosed as soon as practicable after the start of the meeting and the reasons given for declaring such interest.

As members are aware, the provisions of the Local Government Act restrict any member who has declared a pecuniary interest in any matter from participating in the discussion or voting on that matter, and requires that member to vacate the Chamber.

Council's Code of Conduct provides that if members have a non-pecuniary conflict of interest, the nature of the conflict must be disclosed. The Code of Conduct also provides for a number of ways in which a member may manage non pecuniary conflicts of interest.

It is recommended that Committee Members now disclose any conflicts of interest in matters under consideration by the Tidy Towns Community Committee at this meeting.

The Act prescribes that where a member of Council (or a Committee of Council) has a direct or indirect financial (pecuniary) interest in a matter to be considered at a meeting of the Council (or Committee), that interest must be disclosed as soon as practicable after the start of the meeting and the reasons given for declaring such interest.

As members are aware, the provisions of the Local Government Act restrict any member who has declared a pecuniary interest in any matter from participating in the discussion or voting on that matter, and requires that member to vacate the Chamber.

Council's Code of Conduct provides that if members have a non-pecuniary conflict of interest, the nature of the conflict must be disclosed. The Code of Conduct also provides for a number of ways in which a member may manage non pecuniary conflicts of interest.

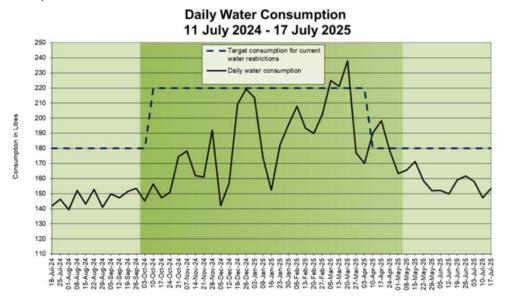

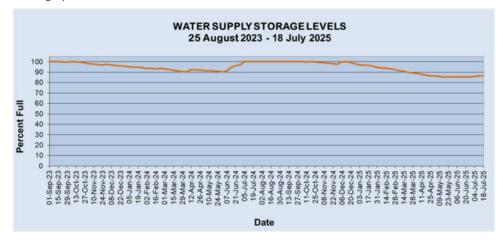

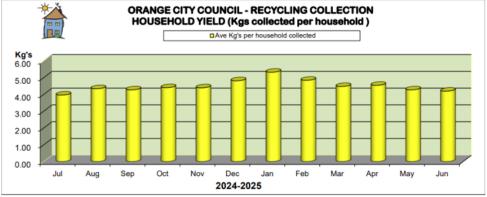

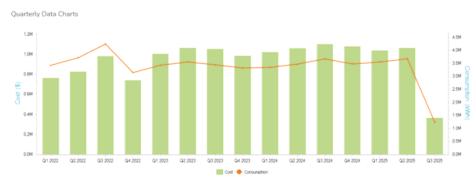

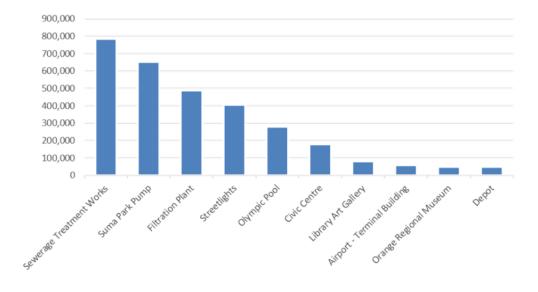


#### **Electricity Consumption**

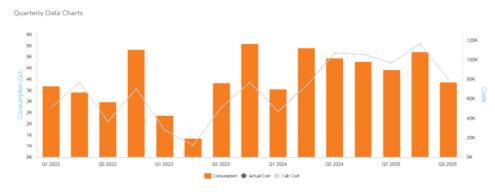

#### **Electricity Generation**

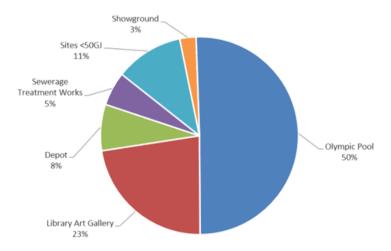
Council has 19 sites with solar PV arrays, with sizes ranging from 1.4kW (Botanic Gardens) up to 198kW (Aquatic Centre), with a total capacity of 743kW. Of these sites, 6 can be monitored remotely.

#### **Gas Consumption**

Council has 19 sites currently with a gas connection. Historical consumption is presented in the graph below. Please note discrepancies in historic gas consumption are due to gaps in data captured. This issue was rectified in Q3 2023.

Council operates 9 charging ports across 4 sites.



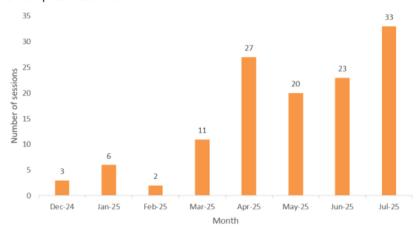

### 4.2 Sustainability Programs Report

#### **Grant Applications**

<u>Community Energy Upgrades Fund:</u> Council has submitted a grant application seeking \$1.4 million co-contribution to support the supply and installation of a 740-kW ground-mounted solar and battery system at the Orange Filtration Plant. The outcome of the application is expected to be announced in the first quarter of 2026.

<u>Grid Enhanced Technologies:</u> The Central NSW Joint Organisation has submitted a regional application focused on implementing grid-enhancing technologies across water and sewer infrastructure in the Central West. As part of this initiative, a 760-kWh battery system is proposed for the Orange Wastewater Treatment Plant. This system aims to reduce peak demand charges, with the potential to deliver annual savings of approximately \$155,000.

Ophir Road Resource Recovery upgrade: EPA grant will fund the installation of a new Public Waste Disposal system at ORRRC on the lower-level carpark area using 5 x "L-Bins" whereby the public can reverse up to the bins to unload small loads of self-hauled waste. This will facilitate enhanced resource recovery and minimise traffic congestion to the upper level public receival bins/Recovery Shop/CRC building. This system will also improve public safety of potential falls from height at the upper level receival bins which will be dedicated to tipper-trailers and small trucks and light weight commingled recyclables.

#### **Climate Change Management Plan**

<u>Sustainable Council Buildings Policy:</u> A draft policy and accompanying standards have been developed to guide sustainable practices in council buildings. A workshop was held with key users to ensure the proposed processes are practical and the documentation is user-friendly. Staff will continue reviewing relevant sections before presenting the policy to the Executive Leadership Team for internal adoption.

Key outcomes of the policy include:

- Eliminating gas from all new facilities, refurbishments, and equipment replacements.
- Embedding energy efficiency and sustainability into building design guidelines and operational practices.

<u>Water education:</u> The Water and Sewer Team are working with the Communications Team to promote Water Night and National Water Week (20th – 26 October).

#### **Emissions Reduction Plan**

<u>Biofilters:</u> Four gas biofilters are operating at the Euchareena Road Resource Recovery Centre Landfill on cell 1. Monitoring will commence later this year. See the recent <u>media release</u> for more details.
